What The Hail?

This summer has brought multiple hail storms to Eastern NC. I'd like to educate you on how to deal with recent auto hail storm damage. I'd like to explain an eco-friendly approach to repairing auto hail damage.

Paintless Dent Repair (PDR) is a highly skilled art which requires years of proper training and practice to achieve. The process consists of working the metal from the posterior side of the dent with one or more specially designed tools. Specially designed lights and Reflector Boards are also utilized until the metal returns to its original shape. Unlike many believe, this process involves no dry ice.

Insurance companies prefer to use PDR methods, when possible, to repair dents created by hail. It is much more cost-effective than conventional methods, and saves time.

PDR helps retain auto resale value, as it omits fillers, grinding, and painting. The original finish of the vehicle remains unharmed, eliminating the possibility of mismatched colors. It also enables the vehicle to retain its

PDR reduces repair costs by an average of 25% to 50% when compared to traditional body shop charges. It is also much quicker than traditional body work, and often all repairs can be completed within one day.

PDR is a "green" service, leaving a very small footprint on the environment. PDR does not require use of harmful chemicals such as paints, primers, thinners, paint reducers,

body fillers, and clear coat spray. It also eliminates any waste disposal fees associated with traditional repairs.

Hail damage is a comprehensive insurance claim and does not affect your rates. A comprehensive auto policy is often required by a bank or loan company that loaned you money to buy your car. This policy is frequently sold together with collision insurance and also may be required as part of the terms of the loan. Comprehensive insures the policy holder against just about everything that is not covered by collision insurance, such as falling trees, foods, bad weather, and fire.

The Bad News... Rising Prices

Between one trip to the grocery store and the next, prices seem to increase. With gas/transportation costs being higher, and drought conditions impacting some crops, grocery prices seem to inflate overnight.

When seeking the best prices, these days it is important to consider not just the dollar amount but also the weight or volume. Product packaging continues to shrink. What looks like the old "half-gallon" size in the ice cream aisle may not be a full half-gallon (64 ounces). That big can of coffee might be a few ounces short too, and the "pound" of bacon may be 12 ounces instead of the full 16. To ensure the best value, shoppers can benefit from checking weight or volume to properly compare the "cheaper" product, and make sure is not just a package with less product in it!

Carmike 10-Wilson Movie Review of the Issue

The movie review this issue is *The Dark Knight Rises*. This final installment of the Batman film trilogy starts with a Batman in hiding, retired and disenchanted, As with most superhero movies, this one is full of action! The direction and computer imaging are well done, and the story held our interest to the bitter, and twisting, end.

Christian Bale returns at Batman/Bruce Wayne for this trilogy end. Several big-name actors round out the cast give engaging performances to draw viewers into the film, including Michael Caine as Alfred. Anne Hathaway creates a "cat woman" for the new Millennium. The slick costume implies "cat" with her specialized goggles, without her actually wearing cat ears. We've liked her in other roles (including Ella Enchanted) and while this role is different she recreates "cat woman" (played in the 1960s by Julie Newmar) who is well suited to the new Millennium.

If you like action-packed movies, likely you'll enjoy this movie. If you're a comics fan, you're probably going to like the story line and references to the prior films.

This tragedy has been discussed in the media, by politicians, law enforcement, and various experts. We encourage you to make the choice to discuss the Aurora happening with your family, friends, children, and neighbors. Open and honest discussions may help everyone understand how to be safe, and vigilant. Perhaps it may also help you find ways to live together peacefully and avoid a tragedy locally.

Watt

Definition: A unit for measuring power in the International System of Units (SI); specifically a measure of the rate of energy conversion or transfer. Defined as 1 joule per second.
