Notice I didn't say local food, local farmers, local restaurants, even local businesses. Oh excuse me; I guess I should introduce myself first. My name is Chad Ray (www.shieldsofgreen.com). I am local as local can be. I live in the Bunn, NC community and went to Bunn schools just like my parents, their parents, their parents, etc. I could keep going back even before civil war times. One of my best friends is the pastor today at the church where my great, great, great grandfather enlisted to join Robert E. Lee. But I digress off my topic for today, which is why you should support local.

I love this paper you are reading right now. You know why? Think about the place where you picked it up, whether it was the local café, barbershop, mechanic's garage, hardware store, or another of the many other small local places of business — they are placed for you to pick them up. These places have been the backbone to our small communities for generations. You probably supported one of those businesses when you took this paper. Thank you because if we don't support them they will all vanish. Some people will say, "So what if it's cheaper somewhere else, that's not my fault." That's true and I'm not saying spend all your money local, just a portion of it. If we all spent just 10-20% of our money at the places I'm talking about we could change not only our community but change the world.

Buying local Fact: When you buy local, your community's economy and general vitality benefit a great deal.

A recent study found that purchasing from locally owned stores created about 70% more local jobs, and 67% more overall local income, per dollar spent. With as little as 10% of purchases being made at local businesses, consumers would add new jobs and critical money would be reinvested in their local economy.

Another study found that for every \$100 spent at a national chain store in NC, \$13 stayed in the community. In contrast, \$100 spent at a locally owned, independent store put \$45 back into the local economy. That's more than three times

reinvested in our community's survival and long term success!

Another example is when you buy food directly from local farmers. Do you know what they do? They spend it. Where, you ask? They spend it at the tractor store, the local diner, the farm supply, the local garage, and many more places. Farmers probably better than any other business sector realize you can be the happiest, most fulfilled, and most successful by spending your money in the community where you

Spending money locally generates local taxes which pay for our police, fireman, teachers, and so many more important people. I know we face what seems to be insurmountable problems in today's world. We can do something about that just by supporting those who make the places we

all live special. If everyone did that, the ripple effects would explode to the state and national level. People say often, "Our country isn't as great as it once was." The USA would be on top of the world again in less than 6 months if we all spent money in the places we live, with the faces who live there with us. A Lifetime in Pictures

My husband and I were working in our Photography Studio recently, when the door swung open and an elderly gentleman, wearing a hat and walking with a cane, stepped inside. Smiling, he introduced himself to my husband who greeted him at the door. Little did we know that we were about to be blessed with an hour in the company of one of Wilson's finest photographers.

Guy Cox, he said, as he shook our hands and we offered him a chair to rest his feet. We had no idea at that point who he was or how far he had come to share some of himself with us. He reminded me of my father, and even though I didn't realize who he was, I immediately liked him and felt a kinship with him.

As he began to talk to us, he was saying, "I'm getting ready to do my last photo shoot, and then I will be out of business for good." It was sad to hear someone talk that way, but in reading about his glowing career — in the 1993 Wilson Times article which stated that Raines and Cox had shot 39,000 studio portraits at that time — it seems understandable that all good things must come to an end.

Mr. Cox genially regaled us with some of his history prior to coming back to Wilson and resuming life here. He was in the Navy from 1942 to 1945, where he was a Navy photographer. His photographs were made in order to provide important ground information needed by the Department of Defense back during WWII. He told us of how he literally sat in the rear seat of a dive bomber holding on to a Fairchild camera and snapping pictures as they made practice dives and flights over enemy territory. According to

> Wikipedia, the Fairchild camera was the official US camera for aerial mapping in that day and time. Another interesting fact is that most of the time, these cameras were bolted down to the plane in some manner or other. The fact that Mr. Cox was able to hold his camera in his hands and get the shots needed indicates how talented he was.

We enjoyed our time chatting with Mr. Cox immensely. My husband found a true friend in that they both like and have used the Koni Rapid Omega camera.

But the treat was not over yet! Mr. Cox allowed me to take a picture of him (at right), and I was very honored to be able to do so.

I gave Mr. Cox a ride to his studio, and he took me in for a tour. I am still in awe of all the hard work being a photographer used to take. I saw his equipment, tried and true, still standing and ready for that last shoot. I saw the hundreds of thousands of negatives that he



had, dating back to 1947 when the studio first opened. I asked Mr. Cox, "What will happen to these now that you are closing for good?" With a wistful smile, he said, "Well, I can't take them with me." It cut me to the heart to look at all those years of hard work about to be sent to the trash dump.

He showed me the very first camera he ever bought. He got it from Sears and Roebuck, and he had paid for it in fifty cents a week increments until he had paid it off. It had been updated through the years, but for him, it had never been outdated.

As I got ready to go, he walked me down to the door of the studio and stood outside to watch me cross the street. "Look both ways," he called to me as I prepared to make my leave of this very special gentleman. He is a piece of the puzzle that makes up Wilson's richly diversified history, and with the final closing of the Raines and Cox Studio, a part that will never again be replaced. That era of photography has closed, and perhaps even sooner than we think, the digital age may give way to newer, more advanced methods of capturing the images of the people and things that we love.


