Community Orchard Growing

Dedication of Rocky Mount's Community Orchard took place on August 15th. Apple trees stand tall in the field, expected to provide fruit when they mature in a few years. More tree planting is planned, with a goal to provide a healthy food source for residents.

The orchard is located just outside Downtown Rocky Mount on East Duke Circle Drive. Mayor David Combs and Rocky Mount City Council hosted the dedication. City Council Member Chris Carroll Miller was present, and she is the one who brought the orchard to this piece of city-owned land.

While not undertaken as an official Council project, the initial idea spurned action by Mrs. Miller, with help from the local Sierra Club and other community members. Since the city already had several community gardens, it seemed a logical step for a City interested in sustainability.

Bringing the plan to fruition did not happen quickly. In the Fall of 2011, an acquaintance mentioned to Mrs. Miller that he was going to purchase trees for a community orchard in another state. He invited her to come tour the orchard. From their initial conversations came the idea of a Rocky Mount Community Orchard.

Land close to downtown was available; a piece of land purchased following Hurricane Floyd. The City had been

With the first of the trees now planted and growing, the aesthetics of the land are already improved, and a food source will add to the land even more. As the trees grow, this orchard may provide a calm, pleasant environment for residents to play, students to study, and families to harvest. Johnny Appleseed would be proud!

Mrs. Miller advocates healthy food sources for local residents, and is an advocate of the orchard as well as local community gardens. She shared that she believes in better health and sustainable living for the City of Rocky Mount.

The Community Orchard is being maintained as a part of Rocky Mount's Parks program. It is hoped the orchard may be maintained organically. Volunteer days coming up in the next year will include pruning and cleaning.

Mrs. Miller envisions the land planted further, perhaps with some bushes and certainly with more diversified types of fruit trees, including pears that will grow well in NC.

Organic Cotton Industry Grows

As reported in 2011, organic cotton is growing in NC. A good volume of USDA-certified organic cotton will be harvested this Fall; the second year certified organic cotton has been grown in Nash County.

According to Mary Wilks of Carolina Precision Consulting, Inc., the 2012 cotton crop looks better than last year's as far



as yield potential per acre. Twenty acres were grown. The quality and quantity of the fiber are expected to improved in this second year.

More acreage was planted; however, wet weather soon after planting prevented timely cultivation. Some acreage was also lost to a hail storm. Approximately 45 acres were disced due to weeds.

More clothing manufacturers are using the NC organic cotton this year. In addition to the shirts made "from dirt to shirt" in NC, jeans and more clothing woven from NC organic cotton are on the market.

Says Eric Henry of TS Designs, "Our goal is to keep as much of the organic cotton in NC, so this year we worked with Raleigh Denim, who made jeans, and High Cotton Ties, who made polo golf shirts."

Five Cases of West Nile Virus in North Carolina

Residents Urged to Take Precautions to Prevent Exposure

The NC Department of Health and Human Services reports that as of August 29, five cases of West Nile virus, including two deaths, have been confirmed in our state. Confirmed cases have been reported in Cabarrus, Forsyth, Mecklenburg, Scotland and Wayne counties.

State Health Director Laura Gerald urges residents and visitors to take precautions to prevent mosquito-borne illness, including regular use of insect repellent and eliminating potential breeding sites around homes and businesses.

"While the Division of Public Health has only confirmed cases of West Nile in these five counties, we want to encourage everyone to protect themselves, especially at this time of year, when mosquitoes are most active," Dr. Gerald said. "West Nile, and other mosquito-borne illness, can occur in any county in NC."

Gerald added that about 80 percent of people infected with West Nile, or 4 out of 5, will not show any symptoms at all. Approximately 1 in 5 people who are infected with West Nile virus will develop symptoms such as fever, headache, body aches, joint pains, vomiting, diarrhea, or rash. Less than 1 percent will develop a serious neurologic illness such as encephalitis or meningitis (inflammation of the brain or surrounding tissues).

As of August 28, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control reported that 48 states have reported West Nile virus infections in people, birds, or mosquitoes. A total of 1,590 cases of West Nile virus disease in people, including 66 deaths, have been reported to CDC.

According to a news release by the Deputy Director, an orange and white male kitten was found and taken to the Carson Animal Care Center's medical unit for urgent care.

"It is incredible that this kitten could survive the almost 2,700 mile journey by sea without food or water," said Marcia Mayeda, DACC's Director. DACC veterinary staff reported that the kitten woke up the next morning "bright, alert, and responsive," all very promising signs for a kitten who was clinging to life just 24 hours prior.

Staff and volunteers have named him "Ni Hao," a Chinese word pronounced Nee How, which translates to "hello."

Ni Hao is under quarantine and being monitored, a standard protocol for animals entering the US from other countries. "We will continue to provide the best care for Ni Hao, eventually looking for a suitable foster home then finally a permanent family to call his own," Mayeda said.




