Save by Buying Used Video Games? Maybe. Maybe Not.

Rumor has it that the next generation of video game consoles will be much more restrictive. Games will be tied to a specific console. Reselling games could come to be seen as a type of "piracy" and be prohibited.

In the earlier days of computer software, it was easy to use software or move it to a new computer. Or even to give it to someone else when you no longer needed it. Over time, software restrictions were built-in to avoid piracy. These days, software programs are not only not shareable, they attach to a specific computer when installed and cannot be moved to another machine without several steps to unlock, uninstall, and reinstall.

Video games have long required a cartridge, CD, or other media to be in the console for the game to play. If you didn't have the media at all times, you couldn't play. However, the game could be carried to a friend's house to play, or could be sold at the local resale shop. With the large number of game resale stores around, it was easy to take in a game when you were done playing it, make a few bucks, or get credit so you could get a used game someone else had traded in there.

Gaming companies, for better or for worse, see the current system of reselling used games as problematic. When a used

game is resold, no part of the resale price goes back to the gaming company. They are looking to change this.

Games coming out in the next few years will likely lock themselves to consoles in such a way that they cannot be resold or used on friends' consoles. The goal of game manufacturer(s) is to eliminate the secondhand sales of games. Depending on how the games are modified, and the licensing put in place, gamers may have to purchase new games each time, or some used games may be available through the original manufacturer. Either way, revising the system likely will require gamers to pay more. Impact on the video game resale shops could be big, or could leave them behind as only older consoles and used games are available to sell.

A Little Local History Person: Harold Dunbar Cooley

(1897-1974)

A politician with the Democratic Party, Congressman Cooley represented the Fourth Congressional district of NC from the mid-1930s through 1967. He served as Chairman of the US House Committee on Agriculture from 1949 to 1952 and again from 1955 to 1967.

An NC Highway Historical Marker placed in Nashville NC draws attention to his significance in shaping postwar federal farm policy. Cooley was a driving force in

developing President Franklin D. Roosevelt's agricultural program. Cooley backed reforms to provide for allotments, price supports, rural electrification, and soil conservation. Cooley also endorsed the "Food for Freedom" program. A quote attributed to Cooley states, "Bread and butter rather than bullets and bayonets are the most powerful weapons in our arsenal."

In addition to the highway historical marker, the Harold D. Cooley library in Nashville NC is named after Congressman Cooley.

Place: A North Carolina Legend

Located a few miles outside of Bennett NC is a small piece of land known as the Devil's Tramping Ground.

All that is visible is a barren circle in the forest, a bit off a beaten path. Nothing has grown, nor will grow, within the 40 foot ring. Even a US Geological Survey team could not find a scientific explanation for the lack of growth within the circle.

The Devil's Tramping Ground is one of North Carolina's oldest legends. One of the "legendary" explanations for the bare circle of ground is that the Devil spends his nights pacing around in a circle as he thinks of ways to torment human souls.

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From the Vatican, February 10, 2013

I have convoked you to this Consistory, not only for the three canonizations, but also to communicate to you a decision of great importance for the life of the Church. After having repeatedly examined my conscience before God, I have come to the certainty that my strengths, due to an advanced age, are no longer suited to an adequate exercise of the Petrine ministry. I am well aware that this ministry, due to its essential spiritual nature, must be carried out not only with words and deeds, but no less with prayer and suffering. However, in today's world, subject to so many rapid changes and shaken by questions of deep relevance for the life of faith, in order to govern the barque of Saint Peter and proclaim the Gospel, both strength of mind and body are necessary, strength which in the last few months, has deteriorated in me to the extent that I have had to recognize my incapacity to adequately fulfill the ministry entrusted to me. For this reason, and well aware of the seriousness of this act, with full freedom I declare that I renounce the ministry of Bishop of Rome, Successor of Saint Peter, entrusted to me by the Cardinals on 19 April 2005, in such a way, that as from 28 February 2013, at 20:00 hours, the See of Rome, the See of Saint Peter, will be vacant and a Conclave to elect the new Supreme Pontiff will have to be convoked by those whose competence it is.

Dear Brothers, I thank you most sincerely for all the love and work with which you have supported me in my ministry and I ask pardon for all my defects. And now, let us entrust the Holy Church to the care of Our Supreme Pastor, Our Lord Jesus Christ, and implore his holy Mother Mary, so that she may assist the Cardinal Fathers with her maternal solicitude, in electing a new Supreme Pontiff. With regard to myself, I wish to also devotedly serve the Holy Church of God in the future through a life dedicated to prayer.

The Strange-ness

World's Oldest Known Wild Bird Hatches Chick

A Laysan albatross known as "Wisdom" — believed to be at least 62 years old — has hatched a chick on Midway Atoll National Wildlife Refuge for the sixth consecutive year. Early Sunday morning, February 3, 2013, the chick was observed still-wet by U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service biologist Pete Leary, who said the chick appears healthy. Wisdom was first banded in 1956, when she was incubating an egg in the same area of the refuge. She was at least five years old at the time.

"Everyone continues to be inspired by Wisdom as a symbol of hope for her species," said Doug Staller, Fish and Wildlife Service Superintendent for the Papahanaumokuakea Marine National Monument, which includes Midway Atoll NWR.

Staff and volunteers stationed on Midway are responsible for monitoring the health of the beautiful seabirds that arrive every year by the hundreds of thousands to nest. Upon the seabirds' arrival, field staff monitor them and gather information for one of the longest and oldest continuous curvey data sats for tropical seabirds in the world year, but it takes much of a year to incubate and raise the chick. After consecutive years in which they have successfully raised and fledged a chick, the parents may take the occasional next year off from parenting. Wisdom is known to have nested in 2006 and then every year since 2008.

Sue Schulmeister, Manager of the Midway Atoll NWR, said, "Wisdom is one is one of those incredible seabirds that has provided the world valuable information about the longevity of these beautiful creatures and reinforces the importance of breeding adults in the population. This information helps us measure the health of our oceans that sustain albatross."

Ann Bell of the USFWS says, "Wisdom is a symbol of hope. Having complete dependence on the health of the ocean to provide her sustenance she has been able to feed herself, as well as her many chicks through the years. She has also survived the constant threat of plastic pollution most albatross have ingested — including pieces of thousands of bottle tops, toothbrushes and parts of cigarette lighters."

Almost as amazing as being a parent at 62 is the number of miles Wisdom has likely logged — about 50,000 miles a year as an adult — which means that Wisdom has flown at least two million to three million miles since she was first banded. Or, to put it another way, that's four to six trips from the Earth to the Moon and back again, with plenty of miles to spare.

survey data sets for tropical seabirds in the world.

Wisdom has worn out five bird bands since she was first banded by U.S. Geological Survey scientist Chandler Robbins in 1956. According to Staller, "Bands have literally worn out on the bird's leg."

Robbins estimated Wisdom to be at least 5 years old at the time, since this is the earliest age at which these birds breed. Typically, they breed at 8 or 9 years of age after a very involved courtship lasting over several years so Wisdom could be even older than 62.

"As Wisdom rewrites the record books, she provides new insights into the remarkable biology of seabirds," said Bruce Peterjohn, chief of the North American Bird Banding Program at the USGS Patuxent Wildlife Research Center in Laurel, MD. "It is beyond words to describe the amazing accomplishments of this wonderful bird and how she demonstrates the value of bird banding to better understand the world around us. If she were human, she would be eligible for Medicare in a couple years yet she is still regularly raising young and annually circumnavigating the Pacific Ocean. Simply incredible."

Peterjohn said Wisdom has likely raised at least 30 to 35 chicks during her breeding life, though the number may well be higher because experienced parents tend to be better parents than younger breeders. Albatross lay only one egg a
