Actors, Extras & Stand-ins: NC Film Industry Growth

Name a NC industry that has increased a specific employment number from around 700 to over 10,000 since 2010? If you ask someone from the NC Film Office, they will tell you it is the film industry.

Fueled by incentives — mostly rebates on money spent — the film industry in NC has grown so much that spending grew by hundreds of millions of dollars in just a few years, A part of this increase is due to legislative changes in 2010. Two bills in 2010 increased the rebates to film companies filming and employing in the state — something South Carolina is watching carefully and may do in the near future!

In 2010, direct spending from the industry was \$80 million. In 2011, it was a record-breaking year with \$245 million in direct spending — and creating of 27,190 jobs including highly technical and well-paid film technician jobs, acting jobs, and extras. Then, 2012 proved to be another successful year with direct spending of \$376 million. These figure are confirmed by the North Carolina Film Office, which tracks film activity, spending, incentives, labor, and statistics for NC.

According to Aaron Syrett, Director of the North Carolina Film Office, "We can attribute this growth to the North Carolina Film incentive. That being said, our incentive is only as good as our local infrastructure. For a production company to truly take advantage of our film credit they need to hire and purchase locally.

"North Carolina has the deepest infrastructure in the Southeast. From the late 1990s to the early 2000s, we did see our crew leave to take jobs in other states because they were highly sought after for their skills. At that time, North Carolina was not competing for these jobs. Since 2007, our crew who kept their residences in NC have come home and are now working continually in NC. Due to how busy we are, we are seeing that infrastructure starting to grow and keep up with the demand of the jobs that are being created. We are once again one of the top five filmmaking jurisdictions in the States."

Casting agents are a subset of the film industry that relies on local talent. Having local people available to cast into a scene as "extras" help keep production rolling. Many of these are using social media and other tools to reach out to prospects. Search online for casting calls or agents.



This commercial property is close to Goldsboro's newly restored Paramount Theatre and planned recreation center. It's 1400 square foot building is surrounded by a large parking lot. With a sale price of \$50,000 and the possibility of historic preservation tax credits, with a little funding an enterprising entrepreneur could renovate into a new type of business in short order.


