School shopping is just a few weeks away. The sales tax holiday is August 2-4 this year. Take advantage of this option while it is still offered, as 2013 may be the last year. Legislation is being written this month that may repeal it.

During the August 2-4 sales tax holiday, NC shoppers may purchase clothing and shoes (priced under \$100/item), school supplies (priced under \$100/item), some textbooks, computers and computer supplies, and sports equipment (priced under \$50/item). Some everyday items such as diapers, for babies and adults, are also exempt from sales tax.

Kroger-Harris Teeter Merger

Harris Teeter was welcomed into the Kroger family of companies on a recent conference call organized by Kroger. Kroger chief financial officer Mike Schlotman gave an overview of the merger during the call, which is available on the Kroger website for replay.

Mr. Schlotman touted Harris Teeter's positive company culture and values, which are consistent with Kroger's, as part of the company's reason for the merger. He also stated that Kroger expects the addition of Harris Teeter will enhance The Kroger Co. "top and bottom line", by sharing the best of what each brand has to offer. He also praised Harris Teeter's strong management team, saying that many of the team members will continue on after the merger.

The merger helps Kroger reach into regions where Harris Teeter is already established. This includes new and growing areas such as Charlotte and Washington DC. There is minor overlap in Raleigh NC and two other cities, and Kroger will be determining how to best operate the stores.

The Harris Teeter online click-and-collect system was mentioned as of great interest to Kroger. Teams from both organization will be developing work plans for this system.

Officially there are no plan to close stores; however it was mentioned that the Federal Trade Commission filing is not submitted, and operation decisions are yet to be made.

It was also mentioned on the conference call that the deal is being financed with debt, including \$100M debt of Harris Teeter. Kroger has a Bridge loan in place to fund the transaction.







Female Veterans Symposium 2013 a Success

The first Female Veterans Symposium 2013 "Care After Trauma" organized by Gary M. Blue, Local Veterans Employment Representative (LVER) of NC JobLink and Phyllis E. Maynard, Disabled American Veterans Service Officer representing DAV Regional Office Winston-Salem, NC was held on Thursday, June 27, 2013 at the Vance-Granville Community College Civic Center. This was an all day event. In attendance, were forty-one (41) female veterans of whom ten (10) represented agencies; there were seventeen (17) agencies represented with forty-one (41) agency persons present; as well as, four (4) female non-veteran guests.

The agencies supporting the symposium were many, including NC JobLink, Holly Hill Hospital, Disabled American Veterans Regional Office Winston-Salem, Cardinal Innovations Healthcare Solutions Henderson, American Legion Ladies Auxiliary Unit #166 Oxford, Raleigh Vet Center, Disability Rights NC Raleigh, DAV Auxiliary Unit #67 Henderson, Women Veteran Outreach Coordinator VA Regional Office Winston-Salem, Mary Kay Cosmetics Warrenton, Kittrell Job Corps Center, Military and Family Life Counselors DOD Seymour Johnson Air Force Base Goldsboro, Wags 4 Tags Raleigh, Granville County Veterans Affairs Committee Oxford, Infinite Possibilities Henderson, Henderson Police Department, and Henderson Middle School. Additionally, a number of businesses, organizations, agencies, and individual who sponsored and made contributions to the symposium.

Presenters, attendees, and participants asked organizers about a second event for next year. Organizers stated that the planning and execution of a second and subsequent events would be determined by many factors such as financial sponsors, the number of agency participants, the number of female veteran participants, available space, the interest generated by participants, the range of outreach that can be accomplished and other logistical considerations. John H. Clark House

The Strange-ness

Mysterious Activity in Great Smoky **Mountains National Park near Cherokee**

A deep crack was discovered July 12th slicing a Blue Ridge Parkway road in two. The feet-deep fissure, caused by weather, led to the road's closure. This road closure northeast of Asheville is not the only road closure in Western NC. A road closed in Great Smoky Mountains National Park (GSMNP) has a strange cause.

Sixty miles to the West near Cherokee, repeated road closures brought with them mysterious sounds, sickening residues, and heavy vehicle and air traffic.

According to www.skyshipsovercashiers.com, strange things began happening following the closing of GSMNP public roads. Beyond the barricades, residents began reporting loud booming and grinding noises.

Several residents who traveled into the park on foot and by ATV were turned away by armed men. One person who walked through the woods to take photos of the Great Smoky Mountains "Masonic Monument" began feeling nauseous, and shortly after heard loud booming noises. No construction has been seen, despite the noise above and from under the ground.

In addition to a sensation of sickness, some residents have found odd residues on their property following an airplane fly-over. It is unknown what "crop dust" or defoliant would be used in these forest-and-residential areas. More than a few residents developed respiratory illnesses following the residue's discovery.

Several residents and visitors to the park reported unexplained heavy equipment movements and aircraft fly-overs. The equipment included trailers hauling odd structures. The fly-overs included large military aircraft used for containers drops and "crop dusting" aircraft. These activities are near Balsam Mountain.
