

NC Forest Service Using Wasps to Fight Emerald Ash Borer

The N.C. Forest Service is enlisting a small, stingless wasp in its battle with the invasive emerald ash borer.

On Thursday, Dr. Kelly Oten will release a species of parasitoid wasp that can kill emerald ash borer larvae. The wasp lays eggs inside the borer larvae, and as the young wasps develop, they kill the ash borer larvae.

The release will take place in three locations in Granville County: four miles northwest of Oak Hill, four miles northwest of Townsville near Kerr Reservoir, and one mile north of Stovall.

"The wasps are from China, where EAB originated, and they target this beetle specifically," said Oten, forest health specialist with the Forest Service. "The wasps are being reared by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in a laboratory in Brighton, Mich., and have been released for biocontrol of EAB in 16 of the 21 states where the borer has been found."

Releases of these wasps are conducted under specific USDA guidelines, Oten said. The release is being done in coordination with both private and public entities that have forest resources affected by EAB.

Emerald ash borer is a destructive wood-boring insect that attacks ash trees, including green ash, white ash and several horticultural varieties of ash. The insect kills healthy trees after it bores beneath their bark and disrupts their vascular tissues. The emerald ash borer is not native to the United States and was first found in Michigan in 2002. It has spread to 21 states and has killed tens of millions of ash trees in the United States.

The Plant Industry Division of the N.C. Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services established an EAB quarantine covering Granville, Person, Vance and Warren counties following detection of the pest this year. This means that ash trees, the ash borers and any hardwood firewood cannot be moved out of a quarantined county into a non-quarantined county. Firewood refers to wood that is cut to less than 4 feet in length.

The quarantine was established to prevent the spread of EAB to other, non-infested parts of the state.

These local committees, which are composed of volunteers appointed by county commissioners, routinely visit facilities, serve as advocates for residents, help ensure that the intent of the resident's bill of rights is maintained, and work to increase community involvement in long term care facilities.

The Ombudsman program is currently seeking volunteers in Wilson, Nash, Edgecombe, Halifax and Northampton Counties.

Shades of Grey

Some situations are viewed in black and white; right and wrong. Yet, many people think situations also have a **grey** area where solutions are not so easily discerned. This is not just about the choices people make, but the thought process they go through to arrive at their decisions.

Submitted for Your Discussion & Consideration

You're watching TV with the family one evening. It is a weeknight, and you're all comfortable in the living room eating dinner while watching the evening news.

A news story comes on about a child expelled from your children's school for wearing a t-shirt with a Wounded Warriors image. The image included a gun, and the school decided that it violated the "zero tolerance" policy against weapons.

Do you think that you would agree with the school's actions? If you disagreed, do you think you would call the school to protest? What do you think you would say to your own children?

How Grey is Too Grey?

The "Shades of Grey" feature is designed to encourage discussion on social situations and consider problems that may be faced in one's daily life. Solutions may be black or white, right or wrong, or in the grey area. Often people's actions are in the "grey", between right and wrong.

Each person makes judgements a the situation and how it impacts them. Most choose the best option for themselves and their families, without crossing lines into wrongdoing. With the recent fervor over a TV series called *Breaking Bad*, the show's situation is offered for consideration.

In *Breaking Bad*, the lead character (Walter White) finds out that he has cancer. His insurance is not going to cover treatment, and his family faces an uncertain future without him. Despite living a fairly clean life so far, Mr. White reaches some tipping point. He decides to provide for his family by using his scientific knowledge to produce drugs. He begins "cooking" Methamphetamine to be sold by a former student — Jesse Pinkman — who has lived a less-than-clean life.

Certainly on the TV series, things do not go well for Mr. White. His decision leads to high-volume drug distribution, many deaths, and family strife.

With the large fan-base of this show, and so many millions of Americans tuning in to watch Mr. White and Mr. Pinkman do their work — and sometimes to cheer them on — it seems worth putting out the subject for consideration. Just how far into the grey area is too far? Can you see the thought process Mr. White went through in moving from a good life to criminal activity?

What do you think of the choice Mr. White made? Do you think that the extreme situation called for extreme measures? If life took a severe turn, do you think that you might move into such a dark grey (or black) space to serve your family?

NASA and Homeland Security Test Radar for Locating Disaster Victims

NASA and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security are collaborating on a first-of-its-kind portable radar device to detect the heartbeats and breathing patterns of victims trapped in large piles of rubble resulting from a disaster.

The prototype technology, called Finding Individuals for Disaster and Emergency Response (FINDER) can locate individuals buried as deep as 30 feet (about 9 meters) in crushed materials, hidden behind 20 feet (about 6 meters) of solid concrete, and from a distance of 100 feet (about 30 meters) in open spaces.

Developed in conjunction with Homeland Security's Science and Technology Directorate, FINDER is based on remote-sensing radar technology developed by NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL) in Pasadena, Calif., to monitor the location of spacecraft JPL manages for NASA's Science Mission Directorate in Washington.

"FINDER is bringing NASA technology that explores other planets to the effort to save lives on ours," said Mason Peck, chief technologist for NASA, and principal advisor on technology policy and programs. "This is a prime example of intergovernmental collaboration and expertise that has a direct benefit to the American taxpayer."

The technology was demonstrated to the media Wednesday at the DHS's Virginia Task Force 1 Training Facility in Lorton, Va. Media participated in demonstrations that featured the device locating volunteers hiding under heaps of debris. FINDER also will be tested further by the Federal Emergency Management Agency this year and next.

"The ultimate goal of FINDER is to help emergency responders efficiently rescue victims of disasters," said John Price, program manager for the First Responders Group in Homeland Security's Science and Technology Directorate in Washington. "The technology has the potential to quickly identify the presence of living victims, allowing rescue workers to more precisely deploy their limited resources."

The technology works by beaming microwave radar signals into the piles of debris and analyzing the patterns of signals that bounce back. NASA's Deep Space Network regularly uses similar radar technology to locate spacecraft. A light wave is sent to a spacecraft, and the time it takes for the signal to get back reveals how far away the spacecraft is. This technique is used for science research, too. For example, the Deep Space Network monitors the location of the Cassini mission's orbit around Saturn to learn about the ringed planet's internal structure.

"Detecting small motions from the victim's heartbeat and breathing from a distance uses the same kind of signal processing as detecting the small changes in motion of spacecraft like Cassini as it orbits Saturn," said James Lux, task manager for FINDER at JPL.

In disaster scenarios, the use of radar signals can be particularly complex. Earthquakes and tornadoes produce twisted and shattered wreckage, such that any radar signals bouncing back from these piles are tangled and hard to decipher. JPL's expertise in data processing helped with this challenge. Advanced algorithms isolate the tiny signals from a person's moving chest by filtering out other signals, such as those from moving trees and animals.

Similar technology has potential applications in NASA's future human missions to space habitats. The astronauts' vital signs could be monitored without the need for wires.

The Deep Space Network, managed by JPL, is an international network of antennas that supports interplanetary spacecraft missions and radio and radar astronomy observations for the exploration of the solar system and the universe. The network also supports selected Earth-orbiting missions.
