Just about an hour away from eastern Wake County is the Conservators' Center, located in the rolling hills near Mebane. This non-profit houses many animals which have no where else to go.

There is a charge, but it worth it and worth the drive. Ever see a binturong with cats as pets? Ever see a white tiger living with a lioness? Or lions and tigers nuzzling with each other? You will see all this and more at the Conservators' Center.

Some of the animals came from closed-down animal centers, while others were pets that were too much for their owners to handle.

Cute tiger cubs grow to 500lb adults. They will live the rest of their lives at the Conservators' Center, which houses big cats, lions, tigers and leopards, rare animals, jungle cats, plus the New Guinea Singing Dogs and so many more. 





Red Wolf Howl Event

Alligator River National Wildlife Refuge (ARNWR) and the Red Wolf Recovery Program offer an opportunity to learn more about red wolves in a place where these rare wolves still exist in the wild!

The Holiday Howl takes place Dec. 7, 2013 from 5-6:30pm. Suggestions from the Howl organizers:

- Bring a flashlight and insect repellent.
- Dress for the weather; howling will occur except with lightning, heavy rain, or wind or impassable roads. Decision to cancel will be made at least 90 minutes prior.
- Plan ahead! Creef Cut Wildlife Trail is about a 20 minute drive from Manteo!
- Do NOT bring pets.

At ARNWR, Milltail Road, Manns Harbor. Meet at the Creef Cut Wildlife Trail parking lot for a chance to hear the harmonious howl of this endangered species. Contact ARNWR with any questions regarding this Holiday Howl event: 252.216.9464.

According to the US Fish & Wildlife Service (US FWS), the purpose of the Endangered Species Act of 1973 is to protect and recover imperiled species and the ecosystems upon which they depend. In 1967, the Red Wolf was listed as endangered.

The 1984 Red Wolf Recovery plan established Alligator River National Wildlife Refuge (ARNWR) on land in northeastern NC. By 1987, restoration effort began with the experimental release of red wolf pairs at ARNWR. Within a year, the refuge had confirmation of a litter of red wolf pups born in the wild.

The red wolf and gray wolf are the only two species of wolves in all of North America.

The average adult red wolf weighs 45-80 pounds, stands about 26 inches at the shoulder, and is about 4 feet long from the tip of the nose to the end of the tail. To learn more about red wolves and the Service's efforts to recover them, please visit www.fws.gov/redwolf.

Reward Offered

According to the US FWS, twelve red wolves have died in 2013. Seven were confirmed or suspected gunshot deaths.

The number of these "human-related" gunshot deaths may seem small, but it is about 10% of the confirmed population. Confirmed wild red wolves numbered 65 at the end of last year. The estimated ARNWR population is around 100; even at this higher estimate, the dead wolves are about 7% of the total.

The US FWS is requesting assistance with an investigation involving the protected red wolves recently found with confirmed or suspected gunshot wounds, including federallyprotected wolves found in Washington and Tyrrell counties.

In addition to the US FWS's \$2,500 reward, pledged contributions from the NC Wildlife Federation, Red Wolf Coalition, Humane Society of the United States, and the Center for Biological Diversity increased the reward for information on the suspected illegal take of two radiocollared wolves found dead in Washington County. Their pledges raised the reward to \$21,000.



The Strange-ness



The bobcat is now named Reno and is a resident at the Conservators' Center (see photo) outside of Mebane. Reno is doing well and you can visit her any time.




Next time you go outside on a dark night and hear something moving in the woods, it may be a bobcat!
