Down East Event Designed for Seniors

The Down East Senior Games is a recreational event for seniors age 55 and older living in the Edgecombe, Halifax, Nash, Northampton, and Wilson counties. This year's games are scheduled for April 30th.

The games are coordinated by Rocky Mount, Tarboro, and Wilson's Park and Recreation Departments, as well as, J.W. Faison, The Nash, and E.L. Roberson Senior Centers and the Upper Coastal Plain Council of Governments Area Agency on Aging. As a part of Senior Games, Adaptive Events was sprung to life several years ago; when it became evident that older adults living in Long Term Care were unable to participate in the regular games. Adaptive Events is a modified adaptation of the Senior Games designed for older adults with significant medical conditions and physical disabilities. For example, a participant who might not be able to run in a Basket-Ball game can instead compete in a Basket-Ball Hoop Challenge. Individuals in wheelchairs are able to try and shoot as many goals as possible. Some other events include: wheelchair races; cane race/walk; bean bag toss; and miniature golf. There are many more events and host of volunteers who coordinate and lead the games.

There are NO participant fees for the Adaptive Events. The event is free to any person wishing to participate. Participants also receive a free lunch, medals for participating, and goodie bags. Goodie bags are comprised of items donated by local businesses. Upper Coastal Plain Council of Governments Area Agency on Aging partners with Nash, Edgecombe, Wilson, Halifax, and Northampton counties to help make the event a success. Upper Coastal Plain Council of Governments Area Agency on Aging is the only region in the state to provide Adaptive Events and received the Innovative Awards from the National Association of Development Organizations in 2011 for its role in Adaptive Events.

Adaptive Events are for residents of long term care facilities, adults over the age of 55 with physical disabilities, and adults who participate in adult day programs. The events are free to participants and are held annually. This year's Adaptive Events is scheduled for April 30, 2014 at the Reid Street Community Center in Wilson. Registration is at 9 and the events will begin at 10. Each participant will receive awards, free lunch, and goody bags. Residents from Nash, Edgecombe, Halifax, Northampton and Wilson counties are welcome to participate. OPEI Launches "Look Before You Pump" Facebook Sweepstakes

Using the Right Ethanol Blended Fuel for Outdoor Power, Garden and Small Engine Equipment

A new sweepstakes sponsored by the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI), has been launched on the organization's Facebook page. The sweepstakes runs March 21 to April 6, 2014. It offers an interactive message about how to avoid mis-fueling outdoor power equipment, and will reward one lucky recipient with a \$200 gift card for gas.

Legal US residents (16 or older) are eligible to enter the Facebook sweepstakes. The winner will be informed via email on April 7, 2014. To enter, visit the Facebook page via this shortened link: http://ow.ly/uJPAa.

Participants watch a 30-second, public service announcement explaining the importance of putting the right fuel-E10 or less-in outdoor power equipment. After answering a question related to the ethanol warning message, participants may enter to win. The more they share the sweepstakes with their friends, the higher their chances of winning.

The sweepstakes is designed to alert consumers that price alone is not the only factor to consider when fueling outdoor power equipment, such as mowers, chain saws, blowers, trimmers, power washers and generators or other non-road product, such as boats, snowmobiles and motorcycles, with the exception of "flex-fuel" engine products.

It also supports OPEI's "Look Before You Pump" education campaign hitting retail stores, which warns consumers about the adverse impact of putting higher than 10 percent ethanol fuel blends into outdoor power equipment for which it is not designed.

The urgency of the industry's campaign comes from research that shows high-ethanol blends of gasoline (E15, E30, E50, E85), currently on or entering the marketplace, can damage or destroy small engines not designed to handle it.

And, consumer research shows the vast majority of Americans (71 percent) are "not at all sure" if it is illegal or legal to put high level ethanol gas (i.e., anything higher than 10 percent ethanol) into engines such as those in boats, mowers, chain saws, snow mobiles, generators and other engine products.

The Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI) is an international trade association representing 100 small engine, utility vehicle and outdoor power equipment manufacturers and suppliers of consumer and commercial outdoor power equipment. For more information, visit www.OPEI.org.

Here are a few more pointers regarding the diet of two hundred million people. First, a few more recipes:

Bean Soup

This is the recipe of the celebrated soul food of the Mediterranean countries; Mix two cups of dry beans in a pot with 4-5 cups of water, roughly chopped carrots, a few sections of roughly chopped garlic, plenty of olive oil, tomato paste, a little oregano, plenty of pepper, 1-2 roughly chopped onions, and a little salt (if any). Let them shimmer until tender, and there you got it! It is delicious, nutritious, healthy, and very economical, Always serve it with a little animal protein, like a slice of feta cheese, a little Tzatziki (mentioned in part 1 of this article), or sliced hard-boiled eggs — with pepper, olive oil and lemon on them. It will reduce your cholesterol. It did mine!

It is now important to note that people in Mediterranean countries always consider the eating of meals as a celebration, not as an act of hurriedly and guiltily gulping down, Instead, they always they take their time, preferably

in the company of friends, family members or even in company with other fellow humans in a little restaurant and then take a walk slowly for 10-15 minutes.

Avgolemono

And make for a next meal, the famous Avgolemono; it requires a little more attention.

Boil the following in a pot: chicken breasts in water with half a cup of rice, a little pepper, sliced onion, a little salt, and nothing else. When well done, wait until the soup is luke-warm — not hot! Then, in a bowl with 3-4 raw eggs, start pouring — a little at a time and in sequences — a little of the soup into the bowl, beating the eggs with a wire beater or a fork, and pour lemon juice while continue to beat, then pour some soup, then a little lemon juice. repeat 4-6 times and keep beating until the beaten eggs are a white fluid. Pour the entire fluid of eggs into the soup with the rice and chicken. It is zesty, elegant, delicate, and a little exotic.

One more thing: do not worry about exact portions of ingredients. it is a more-or-less affair; use your judgment.

Bunn Draws Crowd for Centennial Finale SPCA Wake Assists in Rescue





The conditions these dogs were living in were atrocious. As many as 16 dogs were crammed into poultry cages high above the ground, living on top of layers of their own feces. As many as 15 large breed dogs were forced to live in small cages filled with mud and waste, feeding on what appeared to be bones of animal carcasses. Some dogs were forced to live in bird cages, sitting in feces and mud.

"It is clear these dogs lived a nightmare. We are grateful to be part of this rescue effort and to ensure these dogs will never suffer that neglect again," said VanderSlik. "Right now what these dogs need most is our medical care and attention. The SPCA depends on donations to help us care for all our animals."

The puppy mill survivors are currently being treated by the SPCA's veterinary and animal care staff. SPCA Wake is looking for donations to help with the cost of the dogs' care. 
