301 Endless Yard Sale Preparing for Extra Long Sale

Johnston County, site of the first US 301 Endless Yard Sale is working with neighboring counties to expand the sale along US 301.

The second annual “301 Endless Yard Sale” will take place the weekend of June 20-21, 2014. The communities along US 301 will join together with deals, antiques, collectibles, and more along a 100-mile stretch of highway between Kenly and Benson, in Johnston County, and new sites in Halifax, Wilson, and Harnett Counties.

The US 301 Endless Yard Sale officially starts on Friday, June 20th and runs through Saturday, June 21st. Many sellers will be located along the stretch in well-established visitor sites, interspersed with families, churches and schools on the route with yard sale spaces.

The event was created by tourism officials in Johnston County but relies on community support from each town planning department, and local Chambers of Commerce, to promote the event within their regions. The success of the sales depend on coordination!

There is no fee for local residents to participate; however, some vendor spaces may charge a nominal “rental fee” to provide booth space. Those fees are determined by the lot owner and are not sent by any committee.

There are no admission fees to shop the yard sale. The event was not set up for that purpose.

Most of the independent yard sales, and business-lots hosting sellers, will be open from 7am to about 6pm.

Vendors may sell almost anything! Popular is junk, antiques, collectibles, dishes and glassware, farm implements, baked food items, crafts, produce, and more.

In our effort to support local merchants, there will be no temporary food establishments or mobile food vendors. No animals may be sold. Food is only permitted for sale by 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations.

Anyone can be a vendor by simply having a yard sale in their yard, at their business, or setting up in designated vendor places. The communities along US 301 have worked with area contacts to establish vendor locations and each town lists available locations. Each town will have worked with sites on permits, parking, public rest rooms, and food vendor guidelines. Vendors should work with town contacts closely to ensure a successful experience for all. From pig races and daily tractor parades to live music and fantastic fireworks, there is something for every member of the family at the 2014 Got to Be NC Festival. The annual celebration of agriculture returns to the N.C. State Fairgrounds May 16-18, 2014.

Children will love exploring the Agri-Plaza and Kidz Corral between the Jim Graham and Expo buildings. They will have a chance to see baby chickens hatch, watch ducklings slip and slide in a pool, see longhorn steers up close and learn how to milk a goat. Children of all ages will also enjoy the daily pig races held at the Hogway Speedway near the antique tractor display.

More excitement can be found on the midway with dozens of carnival rides and games. On Friday, thrill seekers can purchase an unlimited-ride wristband for \$20 from noon until 9 p.m. The wristband is good for the entire day. The same deal is available on Sunday from 9:30am to 7pm.

The Walmart Grandstand will feature a variety of free entertainment throughout the festival. On Friday, visitors can enjoy dog demonstrations from the Wake County Sheriff’s Canine Unit at 1pm and 5pm and the Dog Gone Fast Flyball Group at 2:30pm and 6:30pm. Also on Friday, riders from Carousel Farms will perform a patriotic flag presentation on horseback at 4pm and 8pm. On Saturday, massive antique tractors will compete to see who can pull the most weight in the antique tractor pull competition from 2-8pm. On Sunday, visitors can enjoy garden tractor and lawn mower pulls 2-7pm.

The action-packed “Paul Bunyan Lumberjack Show” returns to the festival this year with daily shows near Dorton Arena. Spectators will be amazed as world champion lumberjacks demonstrate a variety of sawing techniques in a humorous and educational way. For those who prefer chassis to chain saws, the lifted-truck drive-in on Sunday will not disappoint. More than 100 lifted and custom trucks will join the display of antique tractors and farm equipment on the final day of the festival.

In addition to the daily lineup of entertainment options, fireworks are planned for 9:15pm Friday and Saturday.

Dr. Nicholas’ Corner: Life Style And You – The Rules

Alternative to Plastic Designed to be Biodegradable, Plant Safe

Researchers at Harvard’s Wyss Institute have developed a method to carry out large-scale manufacturing of everyday objects — from cell phones to food containers and toys — using a fully degradable bioplastic isolated from *shrimp shells*. The objects exhibit many of the same properties as those created with synthetic plastics, but without the environmental threat. It also trumps most bioplastics on the market today in posing absolutely no threat to trees or competition with the food supply.

Most bioplastics are made from cellulose, a plant-based polysaccharide material. The Wyss Institute team developed its bioplastic from chitosan, a form of chitin, which is a powerful player in the world of natural polymers and the second most abundant organic material on Earth. Chitin is a long-chain polysaccharide that is responsible for the hardy shells of shrimps and other crustaceans, armor-like insect cuticles, tough fungal cell walls—and flexible butterfly wings.

The majority of available chitin in the world comes from discarded shrimp shells, and is either thrown away or used in fertilizers, cosmetics, or dietary supplements, for example. However, material engineers have not been able to fabricate complex three-dimensional (3D) shapes using chitin-based materials — until now.

The Wyss Institute team, led by Postdoctoral Fellow Javier Fernandez, Ph.D., and Founding Director Don Ingber, M.D., Ph.D., developed a new way to process the material so that it can be used to fabricate large, 3D objects with complex shapes using traditional casting or injection molding manufacturing techniques. What's more, their chitosan bioplastic breaks down when returned to the environment within about two weeks, and it releases rich nutrients that efficiently support plant growth.

The advance reflects the next iteration of a material called *Shrilk* that replicated the appearance and unique material properties of living insect cuticle, which the same team unveiled about two years ago in Advanced Materials. They called it Shrilk because it was composed of chitin from shrimp shells plus a protein from silk.

The team grew a California Blackeye pea plant in soil enriched with its chitosan bioplastic over a three-week period — demonstrating the material’s potential to encourage plant growth once it is returned to the environment.

After fully characterizing in detail how factors like temperature and concentration affect the mechanical properties of chitosan on a molecular level, Fernandez and Ingber honed in on a method that produced a pliable liquid crystal material that was just right for use in large-scale manufacturing methods, such as casting and injection molding.

“You can make virtually any 3D form with impressive precision from this type of chitosan,” said Fernandez, who molded a series of chess pieces to illustrate the point. The material can also be modified for use in water and also easily dyed by changing the acidity of the chitosan solution. And the dyes can be collected again and reused when the material is recycled.

This advance validates the potential of using bioinspired plastics for applications that require large-scale manufacturing, Fernandez explained. The next challenge is for the team to continue to refine their chitosan fabrication methods so that they can take them out of the laboratory, and move them into a commercial manufacturing facility with an industrial partner.

Flying Saucer Launching from Hawaii

In early June 2014, a rocket-powered saucer will take to the skies over Hawaii in pursuit of the kind of air (and space) knowledge that could help the next generation of NASA spacecraft bring larger, heavier payloads to the surface of Mars — or return them to Earth.

Built at NASA’s Jet Propulsion Laboratory, the saucer-shaped Low Density Supersonic Decelerator (LDSD) will test a new braking system, and a new supersonic parachute.

The experimental flight test of LDSD is two launches in one. First, a balloon will carry the “flying saucer” to about 120,000 feet — over 22 miles up! Then, a rocket will carry the saucer even higher — and at a much faster Mach 4.

The LDSD will launch from the US Navy’s Pacific Missile Range Facility on Kauai, Hawaii. The first launch opportunity is on June 3, 2014. Alternative launch dates are June 5, 7, 9, 11 and 14.
