Finding Ethanol-Free Gas for Small Engines & Power Equipment

The next time you prepare to fill up your mower, blower, or chain saw, finding ethanol-free gas may be worth a little extra driving. In general, gas stations are offering fuel containing 10% ethanol — or more. This blended gas may damage rubber components or tubing within engines.

Gas pumps may soon offer fuel with a higher percentage of ethanol, which may be more problematic for your power equipment — and boat motors, antique car engines, etc.

If you're regularly using gas with ethanol, check the owner's manual on your equipment to ensure you don't

pour in fuel that could shorten the engine's life.

Some fueling stations still offer gas without ethanol. Next time you're filling a gas can, checking with these stations may help you find ethanol-free gas to use in your gas tank.

The Numbers Really Do Have Meaning

Did you know that a Social Security number (SSN) used to be assigned based on geography?

The first three numbers of an SSN originally denoted the regional office which issued the card. By the 1970s this had changed, and the first three digits were issued based on the address where the card was being mailed. For example, a person living in an eastern state would received low numbers for the first three digits of their SSN. Conversely, a West Coast resident received higher numbers for the first three digits.

According to the Social Security Administration, the SSN is made up of three parts:

Follow-up on Phone **Calls from Tech Support**

In response to last issue's article on callers phoning folks at home and claiming to be software technical support, here are a few places to turn for help if the caller's gained access to your computer or personal information

NC Department of Justice's Consumer Hotline is online, and provides a fraud complaint form online at www.ncdoj.gov/consumer.aspx

Or, contact the Attorney General's consumer hotline at 877.566.7226.

The Federal Trade Commission offers consumer's an option, too. Their "complaint assistant" website www.ftccomplaintassistant.gov allows complaints to be cataloged for access by state and local agencies using their database.

If there is concern that bank account or other private information may have been accessed by the fake technical support caller, it may be prudent to contact the bank or credit union to notify them of potential breach of security.

Access to personal information or computer systems should not be taken lightly; do not feel embarrassed to report fraudulent access; the scam telephone calls have continued for years because their scripts are so convincing. You are not alone.

5 Secrets for Selling Kid's Clothes on Consignment

Trade-In Your Child's Outgrown Items for a Profit

It's time. Yes...time to purge your kids' closets of all those outgrown items to make room for larger sizes.

However, rather than doing the usual closet whipthrough and drop-off of an overstuffed garbage bag of clothes to your local charity, consider what they carry. Talk to the employees about another option that will both streamline your what sells in the area. Looking at the current store closet AND improve your finances... sell at least some items on consignment.

Worried that it would take too much work? Don't. Instead, relax and let out a sigh of relief. Marian Snow, owner of My Cutie Patootie, a consignment and resale boutique in historic #4: Mark your calendar. The store will likely donate downtown Wilson, NC, offers advice on what you need to know to unlock the assets hiding in your kids' closet and drawers.

#1: Sort your clothes and shoes into three **stacks.** The first for the clothes you want to keep that your child may still be able to wear for another season. The second will be for well-worn items that should be given to charity, or if beyond repair, you could use for cleaning rags or just discard. And the final one will be for those pieces in excellent condition that you think others would find appealing. (Hint: Well-made better brands constructed with higher quality materials hold up better through wear and washing, resulting in greater success in the consignment selling process).

#2: Now, take a good look with a highly critical eye. Being honest about the condition of your items will save time in the long run, because the folks at a consignment shop are certainly going to carefully screen the items you bring in. Look closely for spots, stains, tears, missing buttons, inoperable zippers or unraveling hems. Be sure to launder and run through the dryer to freshen them up and remove wrinkles. If the item is not permanent press, give them a light ironing to remove unsightly wrinkles. Lay your items out flat in a basket, box or bin to make them hangerready. Wash sneakers and wipe scuffs off other shoes. If you bring in pristine, nearly mint items, you'll be considered a fabulous consignor, your items will make a great impression and the likelihood of a profitable sale will be increased. New items that were never worn are always a slam-dunk, but gently worn items are also desirable. Items should be in current style, in

other words, originally purchased new less than five years ago.

#3: Visit the consignment store in person and view their website. When you stop in, pay attention to the prices and try to get a feel for inventory will give you an idea of the prices that other folks may pay for your type items. The website should offer a list of brands accepted and give guidelines for seasonality and clothing preparation.

your unsold items for you, if that is your desire, but if you want to retrieve the items that did not sell, be ready to pick up those items per store policy. It will be your responsibility to keep track of when the selling season ends.

#5: Be season-savvy. Though it's tempting to want to sell last year's summer clothing in July, it's actually time to bring in your fall and winter items in mid-summer. Check with the consignment store for the season they accepting.

Ms. Snow says, "My Cutie Patootie has partnered with eastern North Carolina consignors for the last five years, allowing parents and grandparents to share their pre-loved and gently-used kid's clothing items and equipment, recover some of the cost of clothing their little ones, reduce their carbon footprint and make a contribution to a greener planet." She advises consignors to bring in their articles early in the selling season to gain the advantage of longer time on the racks and increase the possibility of making a sale. Newborn through size 12 fall and winter children's items are accepted from mid-June through October, and spring items from mid-January through April. Gently-used equipment is accepted year-round.

A Sneak-Peek Preview wine and cheese selling evening is held twice a year to allow prior customers the first opportunity to shop the incoming items available for that season. The fall occasion is held on a Thursday evening early in August each year and is an invitation-only affair for those who have registered in the store. My Cutie Patootie will be holding its tenth Sneak-Peek Preview on August 7th this year.
