NC Bartenders Serving up Sweet-Potato Cocktails During Holidays

Classic cocktails are often served with olives, limes or cherries, but this month bartenders are mixing things up with NC sweet potatoes. More than 30 NC bartenders are participating in the "Sippin' Sweets" promotion sponsored by the NC Sweet Potato Commission.

From now through New Year's Eve, participating bartenders will be selling original craft cocktails using NC sweet potatoes as one of the ingredients. The promotion highlights the flexibility of sweet potatoes that goes beyond baking or serving them as sweet-potato fries.

"North Carolina already grows nearly half of the nation's sweet potatoes," said Heather Barnes, marketing specialist with the NC Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. "In order to expand markets for our growers, we have to look at value-added uses of sweet potatoes. This promotion is a great way to highlight the versatility of a sweet potato in a festive way during the holiday season."

Other cocktails include "The Hot Potato" at Ashten's in Southern Pines, "Sweet Tater Sangria" at HomeGrown in Asheville, "Autunno Inverno" at Vivace in Charlotte, and "Beet My Sweet Mountain Vue" at the Grove Park Inn's Presidents Lounge in Asheville.

Consumers are encouraged to use the hashtag #SippinSweets on their favorite social media channel to share reviews of the different cocktails.

A comprehensive, 21-year analysis of the fastest-melting region of Antarctica has found that the melt rate of glaciers there has tripled during the last decade.

The glaciers in the Amundsen Sea Embayment in West Antarctica are hemorrhaging ice faster than any other part of Antarctica and are the most significant Antarctic contributors to sea level rise. This study by scientists at the University of California, Irvine (UCI), and NASA is the first to evaluate and reconcile observations from four different measurement techniques to produce an authoritative estimate of the amount and the rate of loss over the last two decades.

"The mass loss of these glaciers is increasing at an amazing rate," said scientist Isabella Velicogna, jointly of UCI and NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, Pasadena, California. Velicogna is a coauthor of a paper on the results, which has been accepted for publication in the journal Geophysical Research Letters.

Lead author Tyler Sutterley, a doctoral candidate at UCI, and his team did the analysis to verify that the melting in this part of Antarctica is shifting into high gear. "Previous studies had suggested that this region is starting to change very dramatically since the 1990s, and we wanted to see how all the different techniques compared," Sutterley said. "The remarkable agreement among the tech-

niques gave us confidence that we are getting this right."

The researchers reconciled measurements of the mass balance of glaciers flowing into the Amundsen Sea Embayment. Mass balance is a measure of how much ice the glaciers gain and lose over time from accumulating or melting snow, discharges of ice as icebergs, and other causes. Measurements from all four techniques were available from 2003 to 2009. Combined, the four data sets span the years 1992 to 2013.

The glaciers in the embayment lost mass throughout the entire period. The researchers calculated two separate quantities: the total amount of loss, and the changes in the rate of loss.

The total amount of loss averaged 83 gigatons per year (91.5 billion U.S. tons). By comparison, Mt. Everest weighs about 161 gigatons, meaning the Antarctic glaciers lost an amount of water weight equivalent to Mt. Everest every two years over the last 21 years.

The rate of loss accelerated an average of 6.1 gigatons (6.7 billion U.S. tons) per year since 1992.

During the period when the four observational techniques overlapped, the melt rate increased an average of 16.3 gigatons per year -- almost three times the

rate of increase for the full 21-year period. The total amount of loss was close to the average at 84 gigatons. The four sets of observations include NASA's Gravity Recovery and Climate Experiment satellites, laser altimetry from NASA's Operation IceBridge airborne campaign and the earlier ICESat satellite, radar altimetry from the European Space Agency's Envisat satellite, and mass budget analyses using radars and the University of Utrecht's Regional Atmospheric Climate Model.

The scientists noted that glacier and ice sheet behavior worldwide is by far the greatest uncertainty in predicting future sea level. "We have an excellent observing network now. It's critical that we maintain this network to continue monitoring the changes," Velicogna said, "because the changes are proceeding very fast."

The California Institute of Technology, Pasadena, manages JPL for NASA.

The Strange-ness: Mount Everest Climbers More Cavalier Than You Might Imagine

The definition of *cavalier* is "showing a lack of proper concern". Climbers in Nepal have been cavalier — reportedly dropping their trash on Mount Everest for years. Nepal is now telling these climbers that they need to carry down what they have carried up.

Nepalese law this Spring will require mountain climbers to bring their trash away with them. For years, climbers have been dropping their garbage, used air tanks, and even human waste.

Climbing Mount Everest costs thousands of dollars. The equipment and government climbing fees — sometimes tens of thousands of dollars — don't stop people from reaching for its peak. One would think that making allowances for trash pickup and keeping this naturally beautiful area clean might be worth something. Unfortunately, climbers over the past few decades just haven't been bothering to carry back down.

Also listed among the items left on the mountain are bodies. Yes, human beings cavalierly left behind. Several news agencies reported that in 2006, dozens of climbers ascended past a dying man without offering assistance. While rescue attempts are dangerous — just like the climb — no

rescue was even attempted by those who saw him struggling.

While the new law in Nepal may prevent future trash, it still doesn't provide for cleanup efforts or body removal.

Stories of adventures told by Mount Everest climbers are unlikely to focus on how they defiled the mountain, nor on the bodies that they passed along the way.

Pets, Christmas Trees, and Tinsel Dangers

When trimming the tree this year, keep in mind that household pets may take an interest in the pretty decorations and blinking lights.

Eating stringy tinsel can be hazardous to cats and dogs. Chewing electrical cords may be too. Breakable ornaments unable stand up to batting and playing could mean sharp pieces and potential for cut mouths.

If decorating in a household with animals, it is a good idea to either put the tree out of reach, or keep decorations several feet up on the tree.

For more information on what is safe, or not, during the holidays, check with your vet.

Dr. Nicholas' Corner: The Joy of Hobbies, Part IV

Let's talk about gardening. You see, gardening is available to all of us, no matter where we live; whether in an apartment or on a farm in Florida or up in Alaska where in the summer cabbage grows 20-30 lbs each on account of the 22 hours of sunlight!

If you live in an apartment, you can get an elongated planter. Mix sandy soil together with clay and humus from rotten leaves. Place a little gravel in the bottom of the planter, and drop the mix on top of the gravel.

Keep the soil moist and near a well lighted window. Wait a few days for the weeds in the soil to sprout, and then scratch them out. There! You now have a little garden ready for planting parsley, basil, chives, thyme or other food year-round!

If you have the space, a bigger plot is more fun. Follow the same formula, more or less. If you want to be fancy, test the soil. It is done for free at the NC Department of Agriculture. They will give you advise for improving your soil.

As for the plants, all they need is this soil tip: allow the moistly-prepared soil to sit for a month in order to give time for the weeds in it to sprout. Then, take them out, and plant the seeds of your choice.

Don't forget: your plants will need plenty of sunshine, moisture, and protection from the deer — roaming now even in the cities. I have six regularly visiting my backyard at my Raleigh home!

Depending on the season, I raise okra, two to three different kinds of tomatoes, occasionally garlic, elongated eggplants, three kinds of lettuces, pig weed (Amaranth), scallions, and three types of peppers. Then, late in the season, I plant collards and kale in a 40 feet by 50 feet plot!

I go to the garden often when I want to be alone with my thoughts, marvel of the growing things around me, or observe the miracle of life for each kind. Remember, they grow from the seeds, each following their own instructions using the very same four letters found in DNA. These four letters form words in a long page that ultimately shape a double twisted ladder giving specific instructions on how every living organism grows. The letters are so small you have to have special instruments to see them, but they are all there. This is the same process for all living things! For the birds the flowers, the chickens we eat, for us! (So, should you have the need to pray, this is where!)

A few weeks later when my vegetables are ripe, I harvest them, finding joy by eating my own produce and sharing with my friends — fresh, unspoiled and delicious. I mostly use olive oil and lemon to prepare them. So once again, do not forget life is an adventure not a disease.


