The diagnosis was an ear infection bacterial and yeast — likely caused by a food allergy. The vet treated her ears with medicine, we started buying cat food with fewer chemicals and grains, and all was well.

Then, we saw the grandkids' dog scratching his red-looking ears. The vet took a look, ran a test, and diagnosed the same problem that the cat had; again, some type of allergy. Before we left the vet's office, another pet owner came in and received the same diagnosis: ear infections due to allergies.

Now, I'm no spring chicken and I'd never heard of such a thing until it happened to our cat. I'm also not a vet, so these incidents leave me wondering:

is this due to all the junk in pet food these days or have pet ear infections always been so common?

Either way, the best bet for your pet is, if you see excessive ear scratching, to check with your vet. If allergies are the culprit, the vet may suggest a change in



# March Against Fear

I had the opportunity recently to interview Todd Stimson, on June 22nd, for my YouTube channel. He and a small group of fellow activists marched over 260 miles from Asheville to Raleigh in support of House Bill 1161, which would put a choice on the ballot in November to let the public decide on legalizing medical cannabis (aka, mariiuana) for all patients; not just the genetically modified CBD Oil bill that just passed. # Proposed Smell & Eye Tests May Detect Alzheimer's Earlier

A decreased ability to identify odors might indicate the development of cognitive impairment and Alzheimer's disease, while examinations of the eye could indicate the build-up of beta-amyloid, a protein associated with Alzheimer's, in the brain, according to the results of four research trials reported at the Alzheimer's Association International Conference® 2014 (AAIC® 2014) in Copenhagen.

In two of the studies, the decreased ability to identify odors was significantly associated with loss of brain cell function and progression to Alzheimer's disease. In two other studies, the level of beta-amyloid detected in the eye (a) was significantly correlated with the burden of beta-amyloid in the brain and (b) allowed researchers to accurately identify the people with Alzheimer's in the studies.

Beta-amyloid protein is the primary material found in the sticky brain "plaques" characteristic of Alzheimer's disease. It is known to build up in the brain many years before typical Alzheimer's symptoms of memory loss and other cognitive problems.

"In the face of the growing worldwide Alzheimer's disease epidemic, there is a pressing need for simple, less invasive diagnostic tests that will identify the risk of Alzheimer's much earlier in the disease process," said Heather Snyder, Ph.D., Alzheimer's Association director of Medical and Scientific Operations. "This is especially true as Alzheimer's researchers move treatment and

prevention trials earlier in the course of the disease."

With the support of the Alzheimer's Association and the Alzheimer's community, the US created its first National Plan to Address Alzheimer's Disease in 2012. The plan includes the critical goal, which was adopted by the G8 at the Dementia Summit in 2013, of preventing and effectively treating Alzheimer's by 2025. It is only through strong implementation and adequate funding of the plan, including an additional \$200 million in fiscal year 2015 for Alzheimer's research, that we'll meet that goal. For more information and to get involved, visit www.alz.org.

Clinically, at this time it is only possible to detect Alzheimer's late in its development, when significant brain damage has already occurred. Biological markers of Alzheimer's disease may be able to detect it at an earlier stage.

There is growing evidence that the decreased ability to correctly identify odors is a predictor of cognitive impairment and an early clinical feature of Alzheimer's. the disease begins to kill brain cells, this often includes cells that are important to the

sense of smell.

Matthew E. Growdon, B.A., M.D./ M.P.H. candidate at Harvard Medical School and Harvard School of Public Health, and colleagues investigated the associations between sense of smell. memory performance, biomarkers of loss of brain cell function, and amyloid deposition in 215 clinically normal elderly individuals enrolled in the Harvard Aging Brain Study at the Massachusetts General Hospital. The researchers administered the 40-item University of Pennsylvania Smell Identification Test (UPSIT) and a comprehensive battery of cognitive tests. They also measured the size of two brain structures deep in the temporal lobes — the entorhinal cortex and the hippocampus (which are

and the hippocampus (which are important for memory) — and amyloid deposits in the brain.


"Our research suggests that there may be a role for smell identification testing in clinically normal, older individuals who are at risk for Alzheimer's disease," said Growdon. "For example, it

may prove useful to identify proper candidates for more expensive or invasive tests. Our findings are promising but must be interpreted with caution. These results reflect a snapshot in time; research conducted over time will give us a better idea of the utility of olfactory testing for early detection of Alzheimer's."

An Eye Exam may also help to Detect Alzheimer's. Recent studies have identified beta-amyloid plaques in the retinas of people with Alzheimer's — similar to those found in the brain — suggesting the possibility of simple, non-invasive methods of early detection.

## **Lifestyle Revisited, Part 3**

I just returned from a journey we take once a year to my native country: Greece. It is truly a lovely land of my ancestors, and, guess what? Mediterranean people still eat the Mediterranean diet. Of course, the epidemic of strokes, heart troubles and diabetes we now have here in our own country does not exists there.

Unfortunately, many people there, just like here, are now overweight. It is a worldwide phenomenon. As I have mentioned before in previous articles, we humans were made to gobble up food when we find it, and as at present we do find it in front of us: plentiful, inviting, tasty and fatty. We just eat it and eat it! Further, we often use eating for comfort when we feel bored, rejected, or lonely That is why we all have to be choosy and develop good eating habits — and life habits — to protect ourselves from the unnecessary troubles which result from being slack and unmindful of our body.

I noticed while was there that the Mediterranean people eat very slowly, sitting down, usually with friends or family members. They always have lots of boiled greens and salads as a part of their meals; like, pig weeds. Yes, *pig weeds*, otherwise known as *Amaranthus palmeri*!

We too have this in America and I eat them. Once these plants are boiled, olive oil and plenty of lemon added, they are wonderful and do not need to be boiled twice — like pokeweed-salad does. They are called *Vlita* there and are almost always part of the meal.

Greek people also eat a lot of sliced tomatoes and onions with feta cheese on top, plenty of olive oil. fish and chicken, cooked okra\*, or cooked eggplant. I too eat like that. These all are rich in antioxidants. Antioxidants are life-saving substances which protect our organs, especially our heart and our brain from some

nasty products of our body's metabolism. These products are called *free radicals*. they are truly nasty. They attach themselves to our organs and literally burn them slowly-but-surely, unless there are antioxidants to neutralize them. That's where salads, fruits, boiled greens, green tea, fish oil, vitamin C, and vitamin D come in. These have plenty of antioxidants. Additionally, the vegetables and fruits have fiber and minerals.

Let's review once more what eating habits are needed to protect our lives from stroke, high blood pressure and diabetes. Let's make our lives more comfortable and pleasant.

Granted, established habits are hard to change, so if a person makes a "quick attempt," to change his diet and try to loose weight, the attempt will usually fail even if there is an initial success. We may lose 5-10 pounds, only to gain 15 pounds a few weeks later. If anything has to be done, it should be done gradually, and in steps, in order to establish new habits. Follow these very simple rules:

- 1 Eat very slowly double the time of your eating.
- 2 Never eat standing up.
- 3 Eat only what you put in front of you.
- 4 Do not drastically change the amount of food. but add greens, greens, greens boiled or fresh AND fruits!
- 5 Try after meals to take a walk, each time, every time.

Follow these simple rule without any other attempt for at least 4-5 weeks. By then, it will come automatically and easier.

\*Cooking okra the Mediterranean way: In a circular motion, cut with a sharp knife only the stems of 2 lbs of medium size okra. Brown two sliced, medium-sized onions with generous amount of olive oil. Add the okra together with plenty of sliced, ripe tomatoes. Add 3-4 sliced cloves of garlic, pepper, and parsley, then simmer

until tender. It is an agreeable alternative to southern-fried cut-up okra.
