Water, Not a Drop to Drink

Recent news stories point to drinking water incidents, right here in the US. These events are summarized below.

First, the stories continue regarding the Nestle company Chairman Peter Brabeck-Letmathe working to privatize bodies of water and make people pay to drink clean water. Nestle denies this.

Second, a September court ruling, which was related to Detroit residents' water shutoffs due to non-payment of bills, determined water is not a right. A US judge
ruled that people do not have a right to
water, unless they pay their water bill. This
is all well and good as long as the bills can
be paid, but with the high unemployment in
Detroit, the simple habit of paying bills has
become difficult for many. Businesses and
government offices have so far not been
shut off for non-payments, just people.

The third story is the August impact of algae blooms on Ohio residents. Hundreds of thousands were unable to use their tap water since the water was so contaminated it could not be used. The water could not be used for drinking, cooking, or bathing! Residents were being advised not to even touch the water!

Fourth, scientists in the northwestern US are watching what is being called a *Blob* of warm water moving through the Pacific. They believe it could potentially impact reproduction of fish and ocean mammals.

Finally, lest it be forgotten, there is a drought in California that is considered the "worst drought on record." Some areas are hoping for snow in the mountains, as most of their water comes from melting snow.

With clean water not consistently available at this point in time, only preppers will have drinking, cooking or bath water.

Send Your Name to Mars and Back

If only your name could collect frequent flyer miles. NASA is inviting the public to send their names on a microchip to destinations beyond low-Earth orbit, including Mars.

Your name will begin its journey on a dime-sized microchip when the agency's Orion spacecraft launches Dec. 4 on its first flight, designated Exploration Flight Test-1. After a 4.5hour, two-orbit mission around Earth to test Orion's systems, the spacecraft will travel back through the atmosphere at speeds approaching 20,000 mph and temperatures near 4,000 degrees Fahrenheit, before splashing down in the Pacific Ocean.

But the journey for your name doesn't end there. After returning to Earth, the names will fly on future NASA exploration flights and missions to Mars. With each flight, selected individuals will accrue more miles as members of a global space-faring society.

"NASA is pushing the boundaries of exploration and working hard to send people to Mars in the future," said Mark Geyer, Orion Program manager. "When we set foot on the Red Planet, we'll be exploring for all of humanity. Flying these names will enable people to be part of our journey."

The deadline for receiving a personal "boarding pass" on Orion's test flight closes Friday, Oct. 31. The public will have an opportunity to keep submitting names beyond Oct. 31 to be included on future test flights and future NASA missions to Mars.

Dr. Nicholas' Corner: Prescription for **Survival in Our Modern Times, Part 2**

As I promised in the previous write-up, I will now provide you with a simple plan — and I mean simple — that is easy to apply. If you carry it out, then you will succeed to improve your mood, lose weight, walk lighter, and your doctor may decide to reduce or even stop the now-necessary medicines you may have been taking, with their so many side effects, whether for your BP, obesity diabetes, or

cholesterol. These things will all go down if you succeed in keeping with the plan. Once you start this plan and decide to stick with it, you will see the results right quick!

But I have to warn you. There are three things that will try to prevent you from starting such a simple plan or sticking with it.

One is the force of habit. Our habits will fight our free will like a cornered wild cat, as it were! Free Will does not work very well unless the danger is in front of us and we feel it like a cocked gun to our head; so, be prepared and fight back with determination. Here

is what I mean: three close friends and several patients of mine in the past were trying, with my help and advice, to quit cigarette smoking. Few did. Remember the force of habit and addictive power? Eventually many who continue to smoke developed lung cancer. Once they found out the bad news, they stopped smoking the very next day — along with their immediate relatives! Go figure!

The second problem: our culture is not helping. We have plenty of delicious, greasy foods around. So we eat them.

Third problem: often both mates work long hours to make ends meet and have no time for romance, companionship, or active hobby. Instead, we flop on the sofa and stare at the tube. We tend to routinize our lives. It is in our nature... and it is deadly. So we get bored and eat some more! We end up overweight, cobwebby, and gloomy. And we may even have a

So right from the start you have to know what you are facing. Just what you are up against and be prepared and determined to fight back. Yes, it can be done if we constantly keep in mind all the above.

Here it is: the simple plan:

Step 1 – Eat only three times a day.

Step 2 – Eat sitting down and drink water before eating.

Step 3 – Eat slowly. Double the time it took you before.

Step 4 – Eat only what you put in front of you. Do not



NCDA&CS Announces Specialty-Crop Grant Winners

Nearly \$1.2 million in grant funding is to be awarded to nine statewide organizations through the federal Specialty Crop Block Grant Program, the NC Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services announced.

The program aims to enhance the competitiveness of specialty crops in the marketplace. It is managed by the department and funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture under the 2014 farm bill.

"We're so pleased to be able to award this funding to nonprofits, universities and government agencies," Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. "The selected programs give a snapshot of the variety of specialty crops grown in NC."

Following are the grant recipients and their projects:

- Appalachian State University \$45,807 to study apple production for the NC craft cider industry.
- Farm Stewardship Association in Pittsboro - \$75,790 for its local produce safety initiative and \$40,849 for its organic conservation outreach program.
- Farm Foodshare in Chapel Hill -\$25,000 for its POP Market food hub.
- NC Christmas Tree Association -\$181,007 for optimizing Fraser fir promotions.
- NC Nursery Landscape and Association \$116,600 promoting NC horticulture certification.
- NC Sod Producers Association -\$28,142 to enhance promotion of turfgrass sod.
- NC State University \$125,692 to develop a muscadine clean plant program; \$48,000 to improve

black-truffle production; \$88,802 for increasing winter squash markets in North Carolina; and \$50,481 to produce a new blueberry production guide and update budgets for small and large farms because of changes in cultivar, supply and equipment costs.

- NC Vegetable Growers Association \$100,000 for a campaign to boost awareness of NC produce.
- NC Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services – \$93,550 to administer the grant program and ensure that grantees abide by federal state requirements regulations; \$89,658 for sweet-potato weevil eradication in the NC quarantine zone; and \$60,000 for the NC Good Agricultural Practices Cost Share Program.




