Multiple Reports of UFOs Over NC on Same Date

Three witness reports filed with MUFON share the same time frame, date, and approximate location.

Thursday, October 17, reports filed describe unidentified flying objects between 7pm and 7:30pm. Two were reported near Fayetteville, with the third report from an unidentified NC location yet including video that corresponded to the Fayetteville video — similar flying formations and rates of speed.

The first event had two witnesses, who reported seeing some type of explosion followed by multiple flying objects.

The second report included video and a description of multiple lights moving together.

The third report showed what may have been the same objects, with a description of spark-like lights coming out of the objects.


National Long Term Care Residents' Rights Month



Bridging the Gap between Law Enforcement and Our Youth

Typically, when you invite Law Enforcement (LE) to a community forum something has gone wrong. On Monday, October 13, 2014, this forum did not reflect such a problem, proactive measures to prevent these kinds of issues. For this reason, Riley Hill Baptist Church, Wendell, North Carolina hosted a forum entitled "Bridging the Gap between LE and Our Youth."

This forum reflects concerns on the part of pastor Alfonza W. Fullwood to strengthen LE and community relations. In the aftermath of the Ferguson, Missouri incident, pastor Fullwood took the initiative to explore strategies to help bridge the gap of mistrust, and misunderstanding that, if not address, widens the gap between LE and community, especially young African American males. In doing so, the rate of positive outcomes in the context of LE interaction with our young people improves. To this end, pastor Fullwood

invited the following LE departments—Knightdale, Wendell, Zebulon, City of Raleigh, Wake County Sheriff Office and NC State Highway Patrol to participate in forum. Additionally, Wake County District Court Judge Craig Croom balanced the forum with judicial perspectives, also a guest panelist. Burnetta J. Smith, Executive Director for the Housing Authority of the County of Wake served as facilitator.

The Forum focused on several topics of discussion including appropriate compliant attitude when stopped by LE, Racial Profiling, Search and Seizures, and Community Relations.

This forum resulted in several helpful tips participants took away with respect to how to interact with LE. The following are a few useful suggestions that will facilitate positive outcomes when stopped by LE:

- Stay calm and in control of your words, body language, emotions, and be polite.
- Keep hands where LE can see them.

- Do not interfere with or obstruct LE.
- Do not lie or give false documents.
- Keep your license and registration in your overhead visor instead of the glove compartment — reaching for your glove compartment could be misconstrued as reaching for a weapon. Let the officer know where they are and ask permission to get them.
- If LE violates your rights, file a written complaint.

At the conclusion, there were several recommendations concerning the question "where to go from here?"

- Create initiatives that will improve interactions between LE and the community.
- Create additional opportunities to inform the community about their legal rights.
- Promote awareness of laws to foster responsible citizenship.
- LE should hire qualified minority officers when opportunity permits.
- LE should continue diversity and
- Sensitivity training as necessary.

Dealing with LE involves a delicate balance between knowing your rights and being respectful – both are very crucial. Attendees echoed that they found the advice informative and practical. Mrs. Smith stated, "This is an excellent start, and more forums are needed to bring LE and the community together to address the issues on how to bridge the gap." Pastor Fullwood often reminds his congregation to respect LE and know their rights.

The Wendell Chapter of Top Ladies of Distinction collaborated with the church for this forum.

Under the Dome to Remain in NC for Third Season

CBS Television Studios officials have notified the North Carolina Film Office that they intend to remain in North Carolina for filming of "Under the Dome's" third season. The news came shortly after the CBS Television Network announced it had renewed the hit summer series.

"It is our pleasure to return to North Carolina for our third season of Under the Dome," said Kevin Berg, Executive Vice President of Production for CBS Television Studios. "The film community in the state, and particularly in the greater Wilmington area, is simply outstanding.

"We want to thank Governor Pat McCrory, Secretary of Commerce Sharon Decker, members of the newly formed Economic Development Partnership of North Carolina, the many behind-thescenes people in Wilmington and the team at EUE/Screen Gems Studios for all their efforts to keep our series here," continued Berg.

"We are thrilled that Under the Dome will be staying in North Carolina," said Secretary Decker "Our state's beauty and strong film industry infrastructure definitely were a key in helping us keep this series home in North Carolina."

"This a great win for the Economic Development Partnership of North Carolina," said John Lassiter, chairman of the EDP "The series will continue to have a positive financial impact on North Carolina's economy. This is great news for the film industry and communities in our state. These are the kind of long running productions we hope to continue to attract to NC."

"Under the Dome" ranked as the summer's top scripted series for the second straight year, with 11 million viewers in 2014. The series has filmed in New Hanover. Pender and Brunswick counties since its infancy. In 2013, audit reports by the North Carolina Department of Revenue show the series had a direct in-state spend of more \$33.3 million while employing a total of 1500 individuals. Audit figures for 2014 are not available at this time.

Season Two of the series is one of more than 60 productions that have filmed in North Carolina so far in 2014. Combined, these productions are estimated to have a direct in-state spend in excess of \$300 million, according to the N.C. Film Office.

Filming of the third season is scheduled for first quarter of 2015.




