## Eastern Farm Tour Highlights Local Farms & Farmers

Know your farmer. You don't see that statement in the big box stores, do you? If you had gone to the 9<sup>th</sup> Annual Eastern Farm Tour organized by the Carolina Farm Stewardship Association on September 20-21, 2014, you could have met and got to know your farmer.

There were 27 farms to visit this year with cost of an entry button, the \$30 per car load which gives you unlimited access to the farms. Two days in gorgeous weather let visitors see vegetable farms from the inner cities of Raleigh and Durham, to see an emu or two, and peacocks in Wake Forest, or see Belted Galloway cattle ("Oreo" cows) in the wilds of Franklin County. The harvests from the farms are sold Community through Supported Agriculture (CSA), directly off the farm, at farmers markets, or to local restaurants. If you are thinking about starting your own garden, the ideas you see working on these farms will help you a lot in planning your future garden — from no-till to hydroponics and everything in between.

The Eastern Farm Tour is a great way to spend to spend a weekend with your children. Letting them see where their vegetables come from, or pet a goat, is a great way to spend time outside. Some farms allow children to gather eggs from the hens for a hands-on experience. Vollmer Farm in Bunn has the "Back 40" for family fun going on too. Tractor rides, a slide, pet a goat, and pick-your-own pumpkin patch, just to name a few.

If you missed the farm tour this year, don't worry. It will be happening again next September 2015. If you can't wait that long, there are other tours in the state: Piedmont Farm Tour in April 2015 and the Triad Farm Tour in June 2015.

### NCDA&CS Offers Organic Certification Cost-share Assistance

Organic growers in North Carolina can apply for partial reimbursement of the cost of becoming certified or for recertification through a program offered by the NC Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (NCDA&CS).

Growers who are certified or recertified between October 1, 2013, and September 30, 2014, can apply for assistance through the program. The program will pay 75 percent of the cost of certification up to a total of \$750.

Under the grant, operations can be certified and reimbursed in four separate categories: crops, livestock, wild crop, and handler/processor.

The program is for the 2013-2014 season and is funded through a \$212,000 grant from the US Department of Agriculture. Funds are available on a first-come, first-served basis. Applications must be postmarked by December 1, 2014.

To apply, growers must provide the completed application, along with detailed invoices/statements from the certifying agency listing all National Organic Program certified costs, an IRS W-9 form, and a copy of the certificate or letter from the certifier — if this is a new certification. All charges must be for USDA organic certification.

## Farm Aid 2014 Rocks the Triangle, Helps Small Farms Nationwide

The Farm Aid 2014 concert in Raleigh gave local residents a chance to support small farms, gave local farmers a voice, and let all of them enjoy great music and concessions.

The event day started with an 11am press conference. Farm Aid's founders - Willie Nelson, John Mellencamp, Neil Young — and Dave Matthews joined local farmers in speaking to the press, covering issues farmers face.

Even after three decades of Farm Aid, farmers still face some of the same issues. Small farms still need support, which Farm Aid strives to provide year round, and through its unique concert experience.

Following the press conference, the crowd of concert-goers entered the Once inside the gates, my family and I found tons to do! Farm Aid 2014 combined the best of a county fair, a concert, and a farmers market!

The concert line-up combined a variety of musicians, assuring that there was something for just about everyone. While the music played, the path around the stage was full of activity.

We walked around through most of the concert, enjoying the music booming, and occasionally checking out the stage. There was just so much to do! We sampled from the special concert menu, which listed the local farms' names alongside food descriptions. Homegrown Concessions® by Farm aid were served throughout the event, providing good

local food for a few bucks more than a person would spend for the normal festival junk food. We knew that whatever we selected, it would be local, non-GMO, free range, or all three. The NC paw paw Italian Ice was so tasty, we had it after lunch and dinner.

In addition to eating our way through the festival, the family and I also checked out the expo and attended presentations given by local farmers.

By mid-afternoon, we were sitting on hay bales learning how to make pepper jelly. There were chairs, but why? Bales seemed appropriate! We sat listening to farmers from Two Chicks Farm (Hillsborough) teaching how to make pepper jelly from fresh garden peppers.

The organizers expected, and received, a large crowd. They planned accordingly, arranging for dishes and utensils to be recyclable to minimize trash generated by the event. Volunteers helped people throw things into the right bins. Plus, trucks full of water were available freely to those with reusable water bottles to further minimize waste.

For our family, their concessions will be the food by which every other festival will be measured. Hopefully more venues will move to local food, and recycling all utensils. If it can be done for the audience at Farm Aid, other events could do it too! Can you imagine the boon to local farms?



## Buyout for Elm City Solar Project

Released by Daniel Van Clief, HelioSage Energy

HelioSage Energy, a national developer of utility scale solar projects, has announced the sale of a 40 megawatt AC (MW) solar photovoltaic (PV) project to Duke Energy, the largest electric holding power company in the United States.

The project, known as the Elm City Solar Facility, is presently under development in Elm City, North Carolina. When commissioned, it will be one of the largest solar PV facilities east of the Mississippi and will be owned and operated by Duke Energy.

The project was originally developed by HelioSage Energy, who later partnered with First Solar, Inc, a global leader in PV thin film solar module manufacturing and a provider of PV power plant services, to respond to a competitive RFP issued by Duke Energy in February of 2014. First Solar will provide approximately 500,000 FS Series 4 PV modules as well as provide construction management once the project is underway.

"Collaboration and hard work made this groundbreaking project possible," said Matt Hantzmon, HelioSage COO. "We tip our hat to our project partners First Solar and Duke Energy – as well as the community in Elm City and Wilson County – in recognition of this shared achievement together."

"First Solar is proud to partner with HelioSage on this project for Duke Energy," said Roger Bredder, First Solar's Managing Director of Business Development for the Southeastern United States. "The US Southeast is a strategic priority for us, and the Elm City project represents a significant collaboration with major industry stakeholders to meet the needs of regional consumers."

The 40 MW facility is expected to generate an estimated 82 million kilowatt-hours annually – enough energy to power approximately 6,800 average NC homes a year

#### **Enterovirus D68 Confirmed in NC**

The NC Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) confirmed the presence of enterovirus D68 (EV-D68) in six NC patients before September 22, 2014. The specimens that tested positive for EV-D68 were obtained from children 10 and under with respiratory illnesses.

Specific information about the children, including county of residence or hospital location, is not being released. Said Dr. Zack Moore, a pediatrician and epidemiologist with the Division of Public Health. "The confirmed cases were located in different parts of the state, so it is important for everyone to take necessary actions to protect your-

self from EV-D68 and other respiratory viruses. There are no vaccines and no specific treatments for EV-D68, so prevention is the best option."

Enteroviruses are common viruses that can cause a range of symptoms, include runny nose, coughing, mouth sores, fever and body aches. Some patients will also develop wheezing and difficulty breathing.

"EV-D68 is one of many enteroviruses that can cause illness," said Dr. Moore. "Enterovirus infections are not generally lifethreatening but can sometimes be severe, especially for children with asthma or other underlying respiratory conditions. If you or your child experience coldlike symptoms and difficulty breathing, contact your health care provider right away."

Health officials are recommending that people take actions to protect themselves from infection with EV-D68 and other respiratory illnesses. A CDC-released info graphic is included at right for reference.

## Dr. Nicholas' Corner: Prescription for Survival in Our Modern Times, Part I

We were made to feel constantly hungry so we would be on our toes to find the next rabbit to kill, cook, and then eat it or finding the next fruit tree. Back then a thousand years ago. we were lean, quick and vigilant. We had no heart attacks, weren't overweight, had no high blood pressure or strokes or gloomy feelings. Of course, we had other problems then — like looking out for the. next lion lurking in the bush ready to get us. but this is another story.

At present, if we do not have a plan even a modest one, to protect ourselves, we end up overeating — as we were made to eat food as soon as we could find it. Now, plenty of delicious, greasy, fast food made-toorder is easily available and we end up overweight. We carry it with us, no matter where. We will go 30, 40 or even more pounds of weight wrapped up around our bodies! We also have no opportunities to move, so we sit and sit and sit, working on the desk or watching the tube on and on! We get also get bored, irritable and we eat some more!

Gloomy, tired, and with shortness of breath, we begin visiting the doctors to take care of our now high blood pressure, diabetes — even stroke or worse. The doctors order necessary medicines to take care of the trouble which was brought on our bodies as a result of our habits and life style, but the medicines come with side effects — as often make us feel even more tired.

We do not need to do much to literally save ourselves from this predicament
