

Dr. Nicholas' Corner: Faith, Spirituality, Science and You

Many friends ask me, What is spirituality? How does it relate to science? and, How do I handle spiritual matters and matters of faith with my patients?

Here what I tell them.

Science is a method by which you try to find out how natural

phenomena we all observe, work. You have to follow certain steps and certain rules to do that. It is called *the scientific method*. This is necessary, to avoid beliefs and wrong assumptions messing up your efforts. Here are briefly the steps:

- 1. You observe.
- 2. You make a guess following what you have observed as to the possible mechanism; this guess is called your hypothesis.
- 3. You set up a trial/experiment to prove your assumption/guess.
- 4. You repeat to see if you made a mistake. Your conclusion is now called *a theory*. A theory has to explain a group of phenomena.
- 5. As the phenomena pile up, you improve your theory or revise to make a new one.
- 6. Then, you use the theory and the mechanism you have discovered for practical use; such as, making a car engine, or a cell phone, or even predicting what may happen in the future like predicting accurately as to what date, even years in advance. For example, an astronomer may predict that the moon will be in front of the Sun creating an Eclipse. Science is good for that.

If you are wrong with your theory, other scientists point out your mistake, using the same scientific steps. As we understand more and more mechanisms, new questions pop up. It is endless. Along the way we discover laws of nature that govern the phenomena we observe.

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Science does not and cannot answer questions like, Why are things the way they are? What is out there? Is there after-life? Why are the laws of nature the way they are and not different? Who created the whole thing?

That is where Faith and Religion comes in. We feel there is a supreme being, we believe. He governs the whole universe, we believe. He expects us to behave.

Each group and Tribe in the world puts together their beliefs in a book. Ourselves, we call it the Bible. Other groups call theirs Talmud and Torah. Others call theirs Koran. Still others, the Vedas. That is good.

The Greeks call the supreme being Theo. In our community, we call him God. The germans, Got. The French, Dieu. The Jews call him Elohim or Jahveh. The Muslims call him Allah. The Native Americans call him The Great Spirit. Different names, same supreme being.

The books mentioned above are helping us with our lives. They guide us. They give us hope and peace. They helps us also to be good and decent with each other.

Unfortunately some groups use the books to say: "My God is a bigger God than your God." This is destructive for all of us. Unfortunately, all groups and faiths have done this in the past, and some groups are doing it right now. It is not good.

I tell my patients that we all need, no matter what faith, to take time and contemplate, meditate, and feel what is out there which is beyond our understanding. We all should, from time to stop, take time and try to ponder the mystery of it all. After that, we may consider our worries and grudges petty or unnecessary, while considering the big mysteries of why and what for so our lives may get meaning, purpose, peace, and some joy as we short now, as what things really matter and what do not.

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A Little Bit of History

Extrasensory perception (ESP) Studies

You may be aware that Extrasensory Perception is a way that some people are able to receive information by sensing it with their minds. But, did you know that early 20th century ESP studies took place in NC?

ESP and "parapsychology" — studies of investigation of paranormal and psychic phenomena — had their earliest starts right here in NC at Duke University. The psychologist Dr. Joseph Banks "J.B." Rhine and his wife Louisa performed studies on-campus.

In the film *Ghostbusters*, Bill Murray's character is seen submitting students to an experiment to test psychic ability. Cards with varying symbols are used to test the ability of a person to "guess" the symbols on the cards. Symbols on the cards include wavy lines, a cross, a star, a circle, and a square. Those cards, originally called Zener cards, were used decades earlier right at Duke University. The cards were named for Karl Edward Zener, who worked with Dr. Rhine at Duke University.

Dr. Rhine retired in 1965. Rhine eventually established the Foundation for Research on the Nature of Man and the Institute for Parapsychology. Today, his work carries on at The Rhine Research Center Institute for Parapsychology. The Rhine Research Center continues to research parapsychology alongside newer mind/body health research.

In fact, the Rhine Research Center is seeking participation in a coming "Mind Over Matter Study" related to "Psychokinesis" (PK). As described on their website: "Our present study is designed to learn more about the broad general range of possible spontaneous PK experiences. In the current phase of this study, our focus is on those unexplained physical events that seem to occur specifically around the time of crisis, death or near-death." The complete study description is online.
