# **State Farmers Market** to host Crawfish Day

An abundance of fresh, locally raised crawfish will be available during Crawfish Day at the State Farmers Market. The annual event, sponsored by the NC Crawfish Growers

Association, is one of the few times consumers can enjoy fresh NC crawfish at the market.

Stop by the State Farm Market on June 6, 2015, starting at 10am and running until the crawfish run out.

Crawfish will be sold for \$6 per pound live or \$7 per pound cooked with Cajun seasoning. Vendors will be accepting *cash only*.

There is a 5-pound minimum purchase for live crawfish and a 1-pound minimum for cooked crawfish. There also is a 25-pound limit per person. No pre-orders will be accepted, so visitors are encouraged to arrive early.

The State Farmers Market is located at 1201 Agriculture Street in Raleigh.

While found naturally across North Carolina, crawfish also are raised in earthen ponds found on farms from the Piedmont to the coast. The NC season runs from the end of May to mid-July.

Last year, state crawfish growers raised about 5,000 pounds of crawfish.

## The Strange-Ness

#### Google Underwater View

Google's Street View debuted a new type of view that offers a chance to virtually swim beneath the surface of Loch Ness and search for "Nessie" — or just enjoy breathtaking views under and above the water.

The Google underwater view of Loch Ness was made available on April 21, 2015, which was the anniversary of the 1934 publication of the infamous photograph of Nessie which started the search for her, 81 years ago.



A good place to begin examining Loch Ness is on Google's blog post about this new feature. Start with googleblog.blogspot.com/2015/04/myth-or-monster-explore-loch-ness-with.html, and click the "Street View in Google Maps" link near the end of that article. This takes you to Loch Ness maps, for which the top item to choose is "A view of Urquhart Castle from the water."

Once you are viewing the water, try turning your view "downward" until you see an "X" and click on it. Continue finding and clicking "X" to dive underwater around the loch.

Google didn't make this happen alone. They joined forces with Catlin Seaview Survey (catlinseaviewsurvey.com) folks and the Morar Project (www.lochnessproject.org) to prepare the underwater, 360-degree imagery. Visit their sites to find out how their searches of Loch Ness came to be.

### **NC Forest Service Centennial Celebration**

The public is invited to celebrate the NC Forest Service's 100th anniversary Saturday, June 6, 2015, at Jordan Lake Educational State Forest.

The open house will take place from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. There will be fire-fighting equipment on display, exhibits and activities for kids, such as tree-cookie necklaces and ornaments. The Jordan Lake Educational State Forest log cabin will be open for people to walk through, and visitors can try their hand at using a crosscut saw to cut a tree cookie off a log.

Big Smokey, the Forest Service's 21-foot-tall talking Smokey Bear, will also be there to greet visitors and deliver his wildfire prevention message.

"Celebrating our 100th anniversary at one of our educational state forests is completely in tune with the NC Forest Service's mission of protecting, managing and promoting the state's forest resources," said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. "Our state forests are important for teaching the public about the advantages of good forest management, as well as the economic and ecological benefits of our forests."

The General Assembly created the NC Forest Service in 1915, and John Simcox Holmes was appointed the first state forester. He was given specific wildfire-control responsibilities in addition to his work cataloging and assessing the state's forests.

"The NC Forest Service has gone through many changes throughout its 100 years, but it still continues its core missions of wildfire control and the protection of the abundant and important forest resources of the state," Troxler said.

## **Shades of Grey**

Do you think that it is more important to do what is best for the animals, or likely safe to do something that you've always done or were taught to do?

Ed. Note: According to www.duckrescuenetwork.org, if you want to feed ducks, then feed them items that are more healthful and do not cause as many health side effects. Suggestions on that website include, "...cheerios, grapes cut in half, a thawed bag of frozen peas or corn, or kale, romaine or other leafy greens (not iceberg lettuce)."

## Dr. Nicholas' Corner

**Boredom and You** Editorial by By Nicholas Pediaditakis, MD, DLFAPA

Many of my patients and friends tell me that

they often feel bored!

Let's talk about that.

There are two kinds of boredom. The first is the feeling when "Tomorrow no longer looks like tomorrow but like an everlasting yesterday!" This is the benign type of boredom. The other type is the feeling of "Dread beyond telling!" This is the bad one.

Medically, boredom is defined as a state of undischarged tension. Humans were made to be active, on the run, challenged, and concerned about survival and finding food. We were made to be busy avoiding wild animals and enemy tribes, and taking care of mates and children. Back on the Savannah, thousands of years ago, we were lean and physically fit — save the infectious diseases. Humans had no high cholesterol, no high blood pressure. AND no boredom... There was no time for it.

No longer! While our nature and physical make up are still the same, now most of the time we are safe and have food — plenty of it — to eat and our life becomes routine, day in and day out. We end up becoming captives of the routines.

So we sit and watch the tube and eat. And watch the tube some more and eat again, feeling sluggish and bored. The problem gets worse if you allow this routine to go too far. Then, many of us drink, get irritable, and get into fights with others.

The body gets sluggish and heavy and the now medicines become necessary — and give you side effects. It can get a lot worse if one never was trained from childhood as to how to entertain oneself.

In addition, some of us are born with lopsided temperament and suffer from the bad type of boredom. They may feel an inner void, have difficulties connecting with others.

These fellow humans need medical help, but the rest of us can avoid boredom. Remembering that life can be a wonderful adventure, not a dreary routine. We can exercise, put structure in our life, participate in group activities — political, spiritual, read stories, talk and listen to our child, hug our mate, play with pets, or develop a hobby. Hobbies like cooking, following instructions from strange recipes, or contemplating the wonder of it all.

Let your thought free and ask what all this means! The works. That way, a person can avoid developing dreary "cobwebs in the soul" and allowing our life to be like a disease.

It is up to us. We have will and good sense. Let's use them both.
