Textile Upcycling Company Focuses on Bringing Shirts, and Jobs, Back to the US

That box of "special memory" t-shirts you've been saving in the back of a closet can be turned into a custom quilt, thanks to a relatively new company called Project Repat.

Founded in 2012, Project Repat takes tshirts that you send them, cuts them into squares, and creates a quilt that reflects the person who wore the shirts. Their company plans include upcycling, plus "repatriating" textile products to the US — along with quilt-making jobs!

(For me, this means that my efforts saving my kids' little league, school,

and favorite shirts may not have been in vain!)

You choose the bed size for your quilt and pay the fee, then choose 16 to 69 of your saved shirts (number based on bed size), mail them to Project Repat, and they send you back an upcycled, polartec (recycled), fleece-backed keepsake quilt that my kids may love (maybe) for their birthdays.

Are We Humans in Trouble?

Recently, question have risen regarding if we humans as a species are in danger. Well we

certainly are, big time. We are being faced with circumstances and problems we ourselves have created; here are some of them.

Too many of us have being using the atmosphere as a sewage dump to an astonishing rate. (We are throwing 90 million tons of co2 into the air daily!)

As a result, the ice caps are melting as the planet is getting hotter (the co2 grabs and holds the heat from the Sun), the sea level has risen, and many places are getting dry. The sea is slowly turning to vinegar — killing fish and corals!

In addition, because of our activities, animals and plants of many kind are disappearing very quickly and forever.

There is an increase of the disparity of wealth. A few have collected great amounts of money, while the great majority of us worldwide live from day-to-day by the skin of our teeth.

Poultry Shows, Public Sales to be Suspended Due to Threat of Avian Influenza

State Veterinarian Doug Meckes and Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler announced today that all NC poultry shows and public sales will be suspended from August 15, 2015, to January 15, 2016, due to the threat of highly pathogenic avian influenza. This includes the NC State Fair and Mountain State Fair poultry shows, bird shows at county fairs, live bird auctions and poultry swap meets.

The current strain of highly pathogenic avian influenza has been found in 21 states, mostly in the Midwest, and has not been detected in any state along the East Coast. This strain has not been found to affect human health and does not affect food safety. The virus is thought to be carried by migratory fowl, so veterinary officials are bracing for possible introduction of the virus during the fall migration.

"We did not make this decision lightly," said Meckes. "Highly pathogenic avian influenza is a serious threat to our state's poultry and we anticipate the threat of the virus will increase this fall. We want to take appropriate precautions to prevent the introduction to backyard and commercial flocks."

The decision comes after department officials consulted with industry representatives, poultry specialists from NC State University, fair officials and other related parties. NC joins at least 13 other states that have cancelled or altered poultry shows due to HPAI.

"We know this ban will affect a number of poultry shows and kids who have planned to exhibit at their county fair or the State Fair," Troxler said. "We regret having to make this decision, but we think it is in the best interest of everyone involved. We're working on ways to keep youth who wanted to show at fairs interested in showing."

Health Officials Encourage Caution in Heat

As NC weathers 90-degree temperatures this summer, health officials with the NC Department of Health and Human Services' (DHHS) are urging citizens to take extra precautions against heat-related illnesses.

"Increased temperatures affect everyone, but children, the elderly, those who work outside and those with chronic health conditions are most vulnerable to illness during the summer months," said Dr. Megan Davies, Acting State Health Director and State Epidemiologist. "Simple actions can prevent severe illnesses, trips to the emergency room and even death."

The symptoms of heat stress include muscle cramps, fatigue, weakness, dizziness, fainting, headaches, nausea and vomiting, and are easily avoidable with proper precautions.

To reduce risk of heat-related illness:

- Increase your fluid intake
- Spend some time in cool or airconditioned environments
- Reduce normal activity levels
- Speak with your physician about how to stay safe if you take medicines that can impede heat loss such as drugs for high blood pressure, migraines, allergies, muscle spasms, mental illness and tranquilizers

In addition to these steps, "Operation Fan/Heat Relief" offers people who are 60 or older, or people with disabilities, the opportunity to receive one fan per year to help alleviate heat problems in their home. 
