Utah Police Stumped by Voice

An 18-month-old child was rescued from a wrecked vehicle, more than a dozen hours after the car landed in a river, killing the child's mother. It happened in Utah, and the first responders are stumped by the voice heard coming from the car, even though no one in the car could speak.

Spanish Fork, Utah, police and firefighters rescued little Lily from the wrecked car on March 8, 2015. According to a report from the local newspaper, the *Deseret News*, Officer Bryan Dewitt said, "We were down on the car and a distinct voice says, 'Help me, help me."

The voice was heard by Officer Dewitt and several other officers, including Officer Tyler Beddoes.

Officer Beddoes remembers, "I think it was Dewitt who said, 'We're trying. We're trying our best to get in there."

Hearing the voice, and believing that there was a person in need of help, they overturned the vehicle and found a sleepy 18-month-old and no one else alive. So, who was speaking to them and calling for help?

The officers do not know who it was. What they do know is that someone called them to help, and may have saved little Lily's life.

Dr. Nicholas' Corner: How do People Find the Person They will Marry?

Most people, they say "of course, by chance," — not so! Nothing is accidental about choosing our married partners. And I mean not about those that on the spur of the moment say "let's get married!" and go across the border

and are married for a few months and then they move on; but about marriages that last as a family together with children and with an amount of happiness, and of course with the inevitable up and downs of life. It is in our genes to choose, more-or-less, certain people so that the marriage will last. It is crucially important since human babies are born almost three years too early, as opposed to other mammals, and the babies are helpless and need nurturing and protection for at least five years. They are born too early because if they

wait any longer their head will be too big to pass through — the human baby's head doubles in size the first year! So the mother needs a partner with whom, together, they can take care of the family needs and of the helpless child. So Mother Nature has put certain programming in our brains for insuring that. We marry always with three guiding factors; here they are:

1. One partner tends to always marry (if the marriage is to last) another person with the opposite of their own personality, whether are aware of it or not. (We tend to choose a married partner not only opposite to our temperament, but also similar to a temperament of an earlier important person of our lives; whether father, mother, brother, sister, or someone else who was with opposite personality/temperament to our own.)

So, the intense go-getter gets together with the laid back and accommodating person, and so on. Thus, they don't get in each other's way with their similar personalities.

2. The second factor is one the most important ones. People's marriages last much longer if, in addition to their complimentary personalities, they also have the same more-or-less intelligence, education, similar backgrounds, similar looks, similar value systems, and similar degree of desire to hug each other. (People who hug together stav together!) And further, if they have good manners by upbringing (ethos); like friendliness, eagerness to compromise.

3. The third factor, well, hugging each other! We are the most affectionate mammals, so the more we hug daily, the better.

Some will ask me "Why then in our country do we divorce so often?" "Well," I reply, "Bad manners." Of course when divorce takes place, people tend to blame each other; while in fact, a divorce takes place because of attitude problems of both partners. Of course the difficult economic circumstances of late do not help. Go figure!

A Little Bit of History


Wade Sokolosky and Mark A. Smith have written the definitive study on an often overlooked event of Major General William T. Sherman's Carolina's Campaign, the Battle of Wise's Forks.


Readers of Civil War history have been led to believe the Battle of Wise's Forks was an insignificant precursor to the seminal battle of Bentonville. With the publication of *To Prepare for Sherman's Coming*, Sokolosky and Smith clear up this misconception by drawing attention to the battle that was a significant military operation initiated by Lt. General Ulysses S. Grant. Sokolosky and Smith, both career army officers, completed the book after years of detailed study of archival research.

Both authors will be speaking at the 150th Bentonville Battlefield on March 21, 2015. The 150th Anniversary event at 5466 Harper House Road, in Four Oaks, NC, is sponsored by the Friends of Bentonville Battlefield, NC Historic Sites and Properties, the NC Department of Cultural Resources and the Johnston County Visitors Bureau.


All proceeds from the event support Bentonville Battlefield State Historic Site with a percentage to be used for improvements of the site's visitors center.
