# Three Workers Killed in Raleigh Accident

The City of Raleigh Police Department has identified the victims of the March 23, 2015, scaffolding collapse. The accident occurred at the 11-story Charter Square Building in Downtown Raleigh.

Three young men were killed when the scaffolding collapsed: Jose Erasmo Hernandez, 41; Jose Luis Lopez-Ramirez, 33; and Anderson Almeida, 33. A fourth worker, Elmer Guevara, 53, was injured and taken to WakeMed.

In January, the NC Department of Labor released figures showing that the construction industry had the highest number of 2014 work-related fatalities. The construction industry experienced 19 fatalities last year, 12 more than 2013. Construction fatalities accounted for 43% of NC workplace fatalities.

The NC Dept. of Labor is leading the investigation into the Raleigh accident.

# Nonprofit Greenhouse Rebuilt by Volunteers, Planting Starts for Spring Vegetables

Saturday morning, March 21, 2015, a group of volunteers came together to help the nonprofit Grow And Share install heavy plastic on the greenhouse at its Raleigh location, which is new for this year.

The greenhouse was originally donated by the Tucker family of Zebulon, and was used to grow seedlings for several years. It provided space for Grow And Share to produce tens of thousands of plants and assist hundreds of gardeners, schools, and community gardens. In late 2014, the greenhouse was moved to the Raleigh location.

Grow And Share starts seeds for different types of garden plants, then gives away the plants to local residents and organizations who Pledge To Share their garden harvest. Produce grown from Grow And Share plants feeds gardeners' families, and goes to neighbors-in-need and food banks.

#### **Recalls Announced for Several Blue Bell Ice Cream Products**

Blue Bell Ice Cream of Brenham, Texas, issued its first product recalls, described in a corporate press release as their first recall in 108 years.

Blue Bell is recalling 3 oz. institutional/food service ice cream cups in chocolate, strawberry, and vanilla with tab lids because they have the potential to be contaminated with Listeria monocytogenes, an organism which can cause serious sometimes fatal infections in young children, frail or elderly people, and others with weakened immune systems. Although healthy individuals may suffer only short-term symptoms such as high fever, severe headache, stiffness, nausea, abdominal pain and diarrhea, Listeria infection can cause miscarriages and stillbirths among pregnant women.

On March 22, 2015, the Kansas Department of Health & Environment reported one positive test for Listeria monocytogenes on a chocolate institutional/food service cup recovered from a hospital in Wichita, Kan. This cup was produced in the Broken Arrow, Okla., plant on April 15, 2014. These cups are not sold thru retail outlets such as convenience stores and supermarkets.

The ice cream cups listed herein were distributed in North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, and 20 other states via food service accounts.

The FDA reported that there were several deaths associated with the recalled products.

The recall does not include Blue Bell Ice Cream half gallons, pints, quarts, 3 gallons, or other 3 oz. cups.

Consumers who have purchased these items are urged to return them to the place of purchase for a full refund.

Zebulon Public Works is hosting the second annual Community Recycling Day on April 25, 2015. The event will be held in the north side parking lot at Zebulon Municipal Complex from 8am until 12pm.

Everyone is invited to drop off electronic equipment, batteries, tires, fluorescent lamps, paint, motor oil, and antifreeze for proper disposal. These items are not allowed in landfills to avoid contaminants leaching into the soil and water table. The elimination of these items from landfills improve soil quality and reduce toxins in natural waters.

This Spring when you clean out your garage, attic, or storage room, make plans to bring your hazardous waste items to the Annual Community Recycling Day. All collected items will be processed for disposal with approved vendors following established guidelines to prevent environmental harm. For example, electronic components are dismantled at a facility and shredded into recyclable materials. Used tires are delivered to Wake County for recycling at their Multi-Material Recycling Facility.

#### Bill in NC Legislature May Ensure Third-Party Solar Available

The Energy Freedom Act of 2015, NC House Bill 245, was filed Mar 16, 2015, by several NC legislators. The bill provides for NC property owners to have choice in their energy providers.

The bill would allow third-party companies to install an electric-generating facility on a NC resident's property that would allow production of electricity, heat, or steam for sale to, or for use by, the resident — without Utilities Commission regulation. A \$25 fee is included in the bill language.

There would be size limits, only allowing the generation of up to 125% of the energy used on a property.

Part of the bill describes the purpose of HB245 as fulfilling the state's need to increase clean energy: "...an increased use of renewable and distributed energy resources to serve the State's energy needs will improve the quality of life in the State by reducing generation from sources that cause harm to the public health."

A separate bill, Senate Bill 329, filed Mar 18, 2015, proposes potential credits for those investing in renewable energy on their property.

# Editorial: NC Legislature Seeks to Change Vaccine Requirements for Public School Students

I wanted to preface by saying that the "No On SB346" group's trip to the legislative building on March 24, 2015, really wasn't intended to be a protest. Our real goal that day was to lobby for our cause with as many senators as possible. I was pleased to see that well over a hundred concerned parents and voters from all over the state showed up to voice their concerns about Senate Bill 346.

The primary concern we at No On SB346 have is with the language in the bill that seeks to remove the religious exemption to vaccines. Religious convictions are protected by the First Amendment to the United States, as well as the NC State Constitution, Section 13. It should be very alarming to all citizens, regardless of personal views of vaccines or religious preferences, when our lawmakers take

it upon themselves to legislate any constitutionally-protected freedom.

After meeting with more than a dozen senators, I feel fairly confident that our concerns are being heard and will absolutely be taken into consideration as this bill moves forward. Among others, I spoke with Sen. Paul Lowe, Sen. Stan Bingham, Sen. Mike Woodard, Sen. Jeff Jackson, and even the author and chief sponsor of SB346, Sen. Jeff Tarte. While a couple of the representatives I spoke with are still undecided, the majority are completely opposed to the removal of the religious exemption.

The bill is still in the very early stages, so our job is nowhere near done. We will continue making phone calls, sending emails, and encouraging others to do the same. Our message is this: any elected official who votes to restrict religious freedom will be pursued and held accountable by voters.

Restaurants interested in participating should submit applications by May 31, 2015. Department staff will visit each restaurant between June and September to evaluate menus. Online menus also will be reviewed during the process. The top 10 menus will be recognized in October, and cash prizes will be awarded to the top five restaurants.

#### Record Multiple Domesticated Animal Births in Mid-March

A record number of living lambs were born to a ewe in the UK, within days of the birth of rare quadruplets to a Texas cow.

March 18, 2015, reporter Carolyn Roy of KSLA.com reported that four living calves had been born to a cow known only by its #15 ear tag. The four calves were born undersized but living. Odds against this happening are more than a million to one. The four calves were named Eeny, Meeny, Miny, and Moo. One male was kept with the mother, while the others were sent to surrogates on nearby farms.

The ewe who gave birth to a record seven living lambs — an eighth was stillborn — lives at the Reed Farm, Hatherleigh in the UK. Jon Coates of Express.co.uk on March 22, 2015, reported the record-breaking birth, which is also a million-to-one event. No names are reported for the ewe or the lambs.

#### Plants Sing, Research Says

According to a website, www.musicoftheplants.com, and the work of an Italian community called Damanhur, plants can sing.

Several videos available on the site show plants connected to special devices that "synthesizes" vibrations within plants into sounds that humans can hear.

Since beginning the research at Damanhur in 1976, multiple experiments and presentations have worked to demonstrate how plants not only make their own music, but can respond to musical instruments played by humans, or to human touch.
